## YANKEE SEAMEN SOON LEARN HOW TO HUNT OUT U-BOATS

**American Destroyers Astonish British Comrades With Facility With Which They Take Up Work and Spend Money.**

THE BRITISH PORT BASE OF THE AMERICAN FLOTILLA, via London, June 7.—The American destroyers have completed their first voyage of service in the great war. They have been favored with excellent weather, which is a big factor in anti-submarine warfare. Most of the time they have had sunny skies and smooth seas, with just enough squalls and storms to put their seamanship to test. The favorable weather conditions made their task of learning the technique of anti-submarine warfare much simpler and easier.

The American boats are assigned to work hand in hand with the British squadrons, being virtually assimilated into the British naval machinery here. A destroyer usually is out for two or three days while coaling and loading supplies. Thus each American sailor gets at least half a day shore leave practically every week.

The Americans took their turn with the British boats in all routine work of patrol and convoy. The work, although largely routine, is interesting, and the Americans have never yet found time hanging heavy on their hands. The lookouts are constantly on the alert, and eyes were trained to an unbelievable degree of keenness. The young Americans take seriously the business of finding the periscope mounds, the nautical haystack, and daily reports of submarines sighted, of observations made, of wireless warnings sent broadcast show that the American boats are already making an average of results almost as satisfactory as the long-experienced British boats with which they are operating.

**No Actual Battle as Yet.**

There has been no actual battle as yet between an American destroyer and the enemy, although several reports show that U-boats have been sighted and have been compelled to beat a hasty retreat to the depths of the sea.

An assignment to convey a liner "from home"—that is, from an American port—is regarded as an especially choice morsel. A transatlantic liner which sights the American flag approaching to escort her to land never fails to respond with a great display of flags and handkerchiefs from her deck, and there is a fine exchange of wifeg signals in lieu of handshakes. Several American liners can already testify to the vigilant work of the American destroyers as conveyed to them by a fortunate liner finds herself being escorted to port by American and British destroyers side by side, and about her like twin sisters, a visible sign of the new alliance.

**FOUR CHILDREN MURDER FATHER; ELDEST ONLY 13**

Tell Oklahoma Court How Crime Was Committed—Are Sent to Home for Delinquents.

DURANT, Okla., June 7.—The four children of E. L. Wilkerson, the oldest of whom is thirteen, told Judge Lewis Pauldin in the county court yesterday how they planned and executed the slaying of their father at their home on a farm near here last Thursday night. At the request of the court, two of the children connected the tragedy in dramatic fashion.

Bessie, aged thirteen, and Joe, aged twelve, gave the court a complete and convincing account of the incident. The two younger children, Ruby, ten, and Otto, eight, testified that they followed their father at the older children's bidding. Each testified that Wilkerson frequently swore at them, that they received whippings not more frequently than other children of their acquaintance.

When given a double-barreled shotgun with a request to show the court how their father met his death, Ruby pointed the gun at a hat hung on a chair while Otto, barefooted and chewing gum, calmly pulled the trigger. Three times, the little ones testified, they had gone to their father's room to kill him, only to scurry back to the kitchen from fright. Finally, with the encouragement of the older brother, the children said, they had served themselves sufficiently to commit the crime.

Mrs. Wilkerson died last January. An older sister who then became their foster mother since her marriage, leaving the children to care for themselves. They all were sent to the state home for delinquents.

**CHARLES L. McNARY HERE TO TAKE SEAT IN SENATE**

Charles L. McNary, appointed to the Senate to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Lane of Oregon, has arrived in Washington. The Senate will not be in session until tomorrow, and it is expected, Mr. McNary will take the oath of office on that day.

Mr. McNary is a republican, appointed by Gov. Withcomb, and it is probable he will serve in the Senate at least until the next regular election, which takes place in November, 1918.

Mr. McNary is a lawyer and was formerly a judge of the state supreme court. He is chairman of the state republican committee. The appointment of a republican to fill the vacancy caused by Senator Lane's death makes the political line-up in the Senate now fifty-three democrats and forty-three republicans.

**ENOUGH FOOD, SAYS BERLIN.**

Supplies Sufficient to Last Until "Victorious Peace," Says Report.

BERLIN, via London, June 7.—It is officially stated that at a conference between the British house of lords and the heads of the various government departments, it was decided that there was complete assurance that the food supply was sufficient to enable the country to hold out for the remainder of the crop year and until the conclusion of victorious peace. The conference was held under the presidency of the minister of the interior, and all problems connected with the matter of public feeding were thoroughly discussed.

The conference formulated regulations for the crop of 1917-1918 and considered all possibilities of food distribution. Their conclusions were reached after a complete survey of existing conditions.

**TARIFF BOARD HALTS TRIP.**

Postpones Until Late Summer Visit to Europe and Asia.

The tariff commission's trip to Europe and Asia to study tariff and trade problems has been postponed. It is announced until late in the summer.

"Because of the unsettled conditions abroad, particularly in Russia, according to the announcement, the commission deemed it unwise to leave until some later date. The commission will continue to conduct the investigation of conditions abroad as fully as it may be possible to do from this side of the water, and will hold itself in readiness to go at the first opportunity."

**Honors American Woman.**

PARIS, June 7.—President Poincare has conferred on Mrs. Royall Tyler the gold medal for devotion, in recognition of her untiring work since the beginning of the war as vice president of the American Hospital for Refugees and the Association for the Children of Flanders.

## FILIPINO DIVISION OFFERED TO U. S. FOR WAR SERVICE

Former Delegate Quizon and Committee Call on President to Pledge Loyalty of Islands.

Manuel L. Quizon, president of the Philippine senate, called on President Wilson yesterday afternoon to tender the United States government a full division of Filipino troops for war service. The President listened to Mr. Quizon with interest, and asked him to thank the Filipino people for their loyalty and offer of support, and asked him to take up the matter with Secretary of War Baker.

During his call, Mr. Quizon, who is the former Philippine delegate to Congress, and who represented the Filipino people in Congress here for eight years, headed a committee to present to the President a plate of Philippine gold, set in a frame of Philippine hardwood, carved and engraved by Filipinos, to record the gratitude of the Filipinos toward President Wilson for the passage of the Jones act, inaugurating self-government for the islands. The other members of the committee included the two present resident Philippine commissioners, Jaime C. de Veyra and Theodoro B. Yungco, and Ramon Fernandez, a shipowner of the islands.

After his call at the White House Mr. Quizon made public a statement in which he said, in part:

"Our young men are jubilant at the opportunity for military training and service. There are no slackers in the Philippines. We have more volunteers than we shall possibly be able to use. Labor is plentiful and the crop reports are very favorable. Every department of the government service and the commercial bodies, Filipino and foreign, began co-operating from the declaration of war in placing the country in a complete state of preparedness. We owe much to America and to the great President, Woodrow Wilson, who we are so proud to have elected and eager to liquidate it—in part, at least."

**G. O. P. Advisory Board Confirmed.**

After the House adjourned yesterday afternoon the republicans held a conference and confirmed the selection by the committee of twenty-seven of an advisory committee of five consisting of Messrs. Mann, Gillett, Mondell, Moore and Lenoir. The confirmation was unanimous and the committee immediately adjourned without other business.
