MUST EDUCATE AUTOISTS HOW DETAILS WORKED OUT. Plans for publication of a soldiers' weekly newspaper in every National Army and National Guard camp, beginning with the week of September 30, under the auspices of the national war council, are being actively advanced.

Oil Capacity Exceeds Demand. While the oil refining capacity of the country, Mr. Bedford stated, is greater than the present demand, the United States is consuming more oil at the rate of over 330,000,000 barrels a year, while the annual production in this country is only 280,000,000 barrels.

Vast Gasoline Needs Next Year. To emphasize his suggestion that the production of oil be increased, Mr. Bedford said that this country will require next year at least 50,000,000 barrels of gasoline at the present rate of consumption.

How Business Can Help Win War. How American business can help promote the development of transportation on land and sea as a primary condition of the war and the functions of commercial organizations in war were the chief topics for discussion today.
