Many on List From New England.

BOSTON, May 9.—The names of 1,108 New England men have appeared on casualty lists since American forces landed in France, a tabulation of reports from the front shows today. There were 293 deaths, 793 wounded, 20 missing and 6 reported as prisoners. One hundred and fifty were killed in action, 35 died of wounds, 84 of disease and 19 of other causes. Of the total 738 New England casualties were reported since April 15, or during the time American troops were taking an active part in operations against the enemy. A large proportion of the casualties were from distinctively New England units.

## NEW HOSPITAL BUILDING IS FORMALLY OPENED

The Washington Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital formally opened its new building, 2517 Pennsylvania avenue, Tuesday evening, when thousands of visitors inspected the structure. The building, it is claimed, is equipped in a modern and up-to-date fashion, the rooms are well lighted and ventilated and the arrangements conform to the latest models for hospitals of this type.

The hospital was decorated with flags and flowers. Nurses in uniform on each floor aided in showing the visitors around. Young women of Washington served refreshments.

The receiving line was composed of officers, board members, directors and their wives.

One year ago today the ground was broken for the new building.

**Last Real Son of Revolution Dead.**  
OMAHA, Neb., May 9.—Nelson Moore, believed here to have been the last actual son of the American revolution, is dead at the age of eighty-one. His father at the age of fifteen fought in the continental army and was a member of Washington's command at Valley Forge. Moore was born at Vernon, Oneida county, N. Y.

## NICARAGUAN ENVOY NAMED.

Diego Manuel Chamorro to Represent Republic in United States.

SAN JUAN DEL SUR, Nicaragua, May 8.—Diego Manuel Chamorro, former minister of foreign affairs, has been appointed Nicaraguan minister to the United States.

## Another Job for Boy Scouts.
