Italian Patriot, Captured After Desperate Fighting, Was Subsequently Executed.

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TWO MILLION TREATED IN 51 MONTHS OF WAR

Hospitals in Great Britain and Ireland Lose Less Than a Dozen by Transportation Mishaps.

NEW YORK, November 28.—Hospitals in Great Britain and Ireland have treated 2,391,349 British and Indian troops and German prisoners wounded in the various theaters of war, restoring many thousands to health and losing less than a dozen by accidents in transportation.

WOUNDED TREATED IN THE BRITISH ISLES.

Wounded British (comprising only part of the total casualties of this class) treated in the United Kingdom since August, 1914, are summarized as follows: From France, 1,052,212 officers, 2,048,058 of other ranks; from the Mediterranean, 3,144 officers, 4,574 men, and from the Persian gulf, 1,214 officers, 16,521 men.

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At night the body was removed to a military cemetery and buried in an unmarked grave. An Italian happened to be near and heard an Austrian major giving directions for the removal of the body.

The body was found and recognized. In the castle court, where the martyr was temporarily buried, Atplini had come and recognized a worn leather card case belonging to Battisti.

One of them after having been transported to Innsbruck and thence to the interior of Austria, managed to escape with the connivance of friends.

He had returned to Trent and walked with me below the castle walls where he was confined. He told me that Battisti had requested him if he ever escaped to carry a message to his family.

Battisti's last words were "Long live Italy! Long live Italian Trent! Battisti devoted his life to maintaining the loyalty of the Italians in his part of Austria, while the Austrians combated patriotism with colonization.

Bozano is an example of this policy. Here the signs on the schools and many of the people are German. Italian sympathizers were taken away when the army retreated.

These are now returning by train or wagon or foot. Each Italian lorry returning with women on the front seat and soldiers and civilians covered with dust on the other seats.

Occasionally one sees an Austrian ambulance which seems queerly out of place among Italian troops. In shops here where German is spoken one must make purchases with Austrian kronen instead of the Italian lira.

Each is worth about 20 cents.

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
