MANY BACTERIA FOUND IN ICE CREAM

D. C. Health Department Reports Discovery Following Recent Investigation.

Colon bacilli by the millions have been discovered by the health department in a sample of ice cream taken from one of the large ice cream plants in the District.

Typical fever develops from the colon group of bacteria. The department is making a further investigation to determine whether the high bacteriological count represented an isolated case, due to a dirty milk can or similar cause, or reflects a general condition of uncleanness. The name of the concern is being withheld, pending the outcome of this inquiry.

Statement by Health Officer. Health Officer Fowler said today that the ice cream situation is being canvassed not only at the place of manufacture, but at the place of sale. This product may become saturated with bacteria from causes that could be overcome at the factory or at the place where it finally is delivered to the consumer. Both ends of the traffic are to be kept under strict surveillance.

No Leniency in Specified Cases. The initial leniency to be shown in the handling of the ice cream situation, Dr. Fowler said, will not be followed with respect to the use of soda water fountain proprietors who are found not to comply with definite regulations that have been in force for some time for the maintenance of sanitary conditions. Soda water establishments, especially, are being inspected with a view to determining how generally the regulation requiring the sterilizing of glasses is being obeyed.

Sole Union Man at Macon Out. MACON, Ga., June 6.—The only union man in the Macon office of the Western Union has quit as a result of the strike order, according to officials here.

One Quits at Spartanburg. SPARTANBURG, S. C., June 6.—One of the two employees at the local office of the Western Union Telegraph Company quit work this morning in response to the strike call of the telegraphers' union.

46 on Strike at New Orleans. NEW ORLEANS, June 6.—Western Union officials stated today that business was being moved at the normal rate despite the strike of forty-six members of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union. Eleven out of thirty-five operators employed by the Western Union at the cotton exchange failed to report when the exchange opened this morning.

Conflicting Reports at Memphis. MEMPHIS, Tenn., June 6.—Western Union officials here stated today that only three of the force of more than 100 operators employed by the Western Union in the local office of the company failed to report for duty this morning, due to the strike called last night. Local union officials stated that their early reports showed that between fifteen and twenty operators had already quit work and announced that a more definite statement would be issued later. Western Union officials declared no interruption in the movement of business was anticipated.

C., June 6.—The local Western Union office reports having lost four operators, half its force, as a result of the strike order that was received here last night. The Southern Bell Telephone Company officials say there is no apparent effect there of the strike order this morning.

Two Out at Richmond. RICHMOND, Va., June 6.—Only two men of the day force of the Western Union Telegraph Company's office here had gone on a strike at 11:30 o'clock today and no trouble was reported in handling messages, but it is probable that members of the night force will join the strikers.

Charlotte Has Six Out. CHARLOTTE, N. C., June 6.—Western Union officials at 11 o'clock today stated that six day operators of the sixty-six day force today failed to take their keys. This statement was verified by local union men, who stated that the six constituted the home day union, but that other operators would soon join the strike. Messages are being accepted for usual dispatch.

18 Walkout at Montgomery. MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 6.—Eighteen out of twenty-one operators

employed in the local Western Union office walked out here at 10 a. m. in response to the strike order.
