AMERICAN SEAMEN**

Maritime Workers Reject Arbitration Board Plan Unless Countrymen Get Preference.

CONFER IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, June 28.—Representatives of the big maritime workers' unions have served notice on the United States Shipping Board that unless the board and the American steamship associations, representing the private boat owners, agree that in all deep-water ships American citizens shall have preference, they will not be parties to a joint board proposed by the shipping board and approved by the private owners for the settlement of all labor questions.

Three Unions Involved.

The unions involved are the Seaman's Union of America, of which Andrew Furuseth is the head; the American Association of Master Mates and Pilots, headed by John H. Pruett, and the Marine Engineers' Beneficial Association, of which William S. Brown is president. The unions specifically waive the question of unionism as regards American citizens, but insist that where no American citizens are available preference shall be given to union aliens over non-union aliens.

That a deadlock exists became known today following a conference at 25 Park place, where delegates from the several unions from points as far south as Texas, as far north as Portland and from the Pacific coast boarded the association, after Furuseth, Pruett and Brown, F. Delahunty, speaking for Thomas, had explained the situation.

Want Americans on Sea.

Briefly, as outlined by Mr. Furuseth, there can be no American marine worthy of the name until there is a large body of American sailors; that there can be no large body of American sailors so long as American citizens are discriminated against by owners of vessels flying the American flag, and that the question as to whether there shall be an American merchant marine worth while depends on the extent to which the sea is made attractive as a vocation to American boys. The union's ultimatum in effect sets up an open shop, the idea being to encourage American boys to return to the sea.

**CITES CONVICTIONS
TO WARN TAX DODGERS**

Commissioner Roper Says Sentence of Boston Merchants Typifies Revenue Bureau Policy.

Warning to would-be income tax dodgers was issued yesterday by Commissioner of Internal Revenue Daniel C. Roper in a statement calling attention to the recent sentence of two men to eighteen months each in prison, in addition to a fine of \$10,000 in each case and the imposition of a 100 per cent additional tax assessment.

William A. English and John H. O'Brien, Boston wool merchants, pleaded guilty to a charge of conspiracy to defraud the government after it had been learned that they had kept a false set of books and falsified their inventory at the end of 1917 by approximately \$1,000,000, says the statement from Mr. Roper's office.

"It is and will be the policy of the bureau to pursue tax frauds relentlessly," says the statement. "In checking up of returns evidence to show fraud will be followed by a thorough and complete investigation, which, though it may require years, will be continued until the persons involved are brought to justice. In every case warranted by the facts the bureau will urge the imposition of the extreme penalty."

PICK UP WRECKED SEAMEN.

Two Steamers Bring Crews of Abandoned Schooners to Port.

NEW YORK, June 28.—Aboard the steamship Phoenix, which arrived today from Brest, were the captain and nine members of the American motor schooner N. E. Turner, which, in a waterlogged condition, was abandoned at sea 300 miles southeast of Sandy Hook, May 31, while bound from Norfolk to Bordeaux with a cargo of staves. The shipwrecked men were taken on the schooner by the Phoenix on its outward voyage and brought back upon its return. The abandoned vessel was later towed to Bermuda.

The American steamer Houma arrived here this morning from St. Michael, carrying eight shipwrecked sailors, the crew of the British schooner Phoenix. The Phoenix, bound from St. Johns, N. F., for Oporto, Portugal, founded May 26, 225 miles west of the Azores islands, and was abandoned. The men were picked up at sea by the Houma.










