30,000 WORKERS WALK  
OR CROWD MOTOR BUSES

SALEM, Mass., January 15.—Thirty thousand persons who usually ride to business in trolley cars crowded into motor buses or walked in the near zero atmosphere today. All local lines of the Eastern Massachusetts street railways here and a large part of the interurban service of that company were discontinued at midnight, the public trustees of the road having refused to operate the cars in this vicinity longer in the face of continued loss of revenue due to jinxes.

ENVER PASHA TURNS "RED."

TWO ARE INDICTED  
ON WHISKY CHARGES

J. J. O'Neil and F. J. Hughes Accused in stolen liquor case. The grand jury today indicted John J. O'Neil and Frederick J. Hughes on a charge of bringing stolen property into the district. The property comprises 192 cases of whisky, which the police and revenue officers seized at a warehouse near Camp Leach January 1. Mr. Hughes recently claimed to own the property and brought suit in replevin to get the whisky which is now held by United States Marshal Spain until further order of the court. The replevin suit no mention was made of Mr. O'Neil as part owner of the whisky.

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TWO AMERICANS KILLED  
FIGHTING SEMENOFF MEN

Yankees Reported to Have Captured  
Armored Train Between Lake  
Baikal and Verkhnedinsk.

LONDON, January 15 (by the Associated Press).—Two Americans were killed and three wounded in a clash with an armored train of Gen. Semenov, commander-in-chief of the all-Russian army, between Lake Baikal and Verkhnedinsk, in the province of Transbaikalia, according to the correspondence of the Daily Mail at Harbin. The Americans were reported to have captured the train.

EARTHQUAKE DEATH TOLL  
GROWS TO OVER 3,000

Reports From Puebla, Couztlan and Vera Cruz Tell of Fatalities January 3. MEXICO CITY, January 14.—Reports slowly coming in from eastern sections of the state of Puebla tell of terrible loss of life in that region as a result of the earthquake January 3. Further east in the state of Vera Cruz the death toll seems to be growing, reports from Couztlan stating that the number of dead in that city and in surrounding villages is more than 3,000.

SPECIAL RULE CLEARS  
WAY FOR D. C. CODE BILL

The House rules committee today granted a special rule making immediately in order in the House the bill to enlarge the jurisdiction of the municipal code of the District and to regulate appeals from the judgment of the Municipal Court. This rule was requested by Chairman Volstead of the House judiciary committee. It provides for not exceeding one hour's general debate, at the conclusion of which the bill shall be read for amendment.

J. L. ODELL AND WIFE  
INDICTED FOR MURDER

ROCHESTER, N. Y., January 15.—The grand jury today returned an indictment for murder in the first degree against James L. Odell and his wife Pearl, who on their alleged confessions beat Edward J. Knip to death on the night of January 7. Their alleged motive was revenge for the relations between the young woman and Knip before she married Odell in this city last month.

DAMAGED STEAMER BEACHED.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., January 15.—With a large hole in her bottom, the United States geodetic survey steamer Isis was beached this morning five miles south of St. Augustine. There were no injuries to her crew. The Isis is a converted yacht, built at Newburgh, N. Y., in 1902, and is now operated by the Department of Commerce. She carries nine officers and forty men.

U. S. TREE SEEDS PRESENTED.

BOSTON, January 15.—Thirty-five million tree seeds were formally presented to the governments of France, Belgium and Great Britain by the American Forestry Association here today. They were accepted by the consuls of the three countries, and will be used in reforesting the devastated areas of Belgium and France and the woodlands cleared in the British Isles for war purposes.
