



NO DISTURBANCE AT ULSTER MEETING

Correction of The Star's Report of the New York Avenue Church Gathering.

To the Editor of The Star:

By direction of the Padre H. H. Pearce branch of the Friends of Irish Freedom, Washington, D. C., I wish to call your attention to an article which appeared in The Star of January 14, 1920, entitled "Ulster Delegates Attack Motives of Sinn Feiners."

Arriving too late, I was unable to obtain admission to the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church on the evening of January 13, 1920, when some citizens of Washington were addressed by two ministers in opposition to the cause of Irish independence. I remained on the outside an interested observer of what transpired in the lower church, from 8 to 9 o'clock. My surprise was indeed great when I read in your account of the meeting the following paragraph:

"While the meeting in the auditorium proceeded without untoward incident, attempts to disconcert the speakers were made by their opponents, who were scattered through the overflow meeting. Two persons were ejected from the building by the police. Outside the crowd shouted and jeered at the remarks of the speakers, some of the rowdies raising the windows of the special detail of police, however, soon put an end to such tactics, and the crowd dispersed."

The first part of this paragraph is not justified by the facts and circumstances. It is true a man was removed from the building, but not because of the circumstances. Careful inquiry among many persons who were inside convinces me that this action was warranted in view of the circumstances. The man who was removed, although I did not see that episode, it is quite evident to me, after a careful investigation, that opportunity was sought to lend color to the insinuation that serious interruption by our people took place with a view of hindering the speakers from presenting their case.

As to the latter part of your article, I am in a position to say it is absolutely not correct. I was present and saw all on the outside up to 9 o'clock, and from that time on I have reliable information as to what happened. There were no "rowdies" among us; no one "shouted and jeered" at the remarks of the speakers; no "rowdies" raised any windows, and a "special detail of police" did not interfere in any way, shape or form. There was no necessity, and the crowd was not dispersed. Besides Mrs. Downing and myself in this crowd of "rowdies," there was a prominent banker and his wife, and a number of the best people in Washington whom I know, and all had the appearance of respectability.

Your report has done us incalculable harm, and we therefore ask, in spirit of fair play, that you publish this reply.

I might add that President De Valera has admonished every true lover of Ireland and freedom, who may attend these attacks on us, to refrain from any of the slightest intemperate acts, even the most trifling pretext will be sought to give the impression to the American public that we wish to suppress what these men have to say, whereas the direct opposite is the truth, as witness our invitation to meet them in joint debate, which has not been accepted.

A Statement by Rev. Dr. Muir. Rev. Dr. J. J. Muir, pastor of Temple Baptist Church, who presided over the "overflow" meeting in the lower church on the evening of January 13, when asked yesterday respecting the alleged disturbances at that occasion, said: "There was some slight disturbance at this basement overflow meeting. What went on outside I do not know. Some persons attempted to open windows on the north side. One or two called in, although I could not hear what they said. There was some attempt at heckling of a mild character. There was disturbance at the far end of the overflow hall, but nothing that resembled rowdism."

INDICTED ALLEGED REDS EXPECTED TO SURRENDER

All But Four of 38 Charged in Chicago Are Officers of Communist Labor Party.

CHICAGO, January 22.—Most of the thirty-five men and three women members of the communist labor party of America, indicted on charges of conspiracy to overthrow the government and advocating overthrow of the government, were expected to surrender today. Bonds for their appearance for arraignment in criminal court Monday were fixed at \$10,000 and \$5,000.

For those members living in other states who did not indicate an intention to come to Chicago for arraignment and trial, the state's attorney indicated extradition papers would be sought. Captives for the arrest of the entire thirty-eight would be ready today, he said. The special grand jury which returned the indictments yesterday had been investigating radical activities in Cook county for several weeks. It was indicated its work was not completed and it was believed that the communist party, a separate organization from the communist labor party of America, also would be investigated.

Except for the persons indicted yesterday were local, state or national officers of the organization. "Active organizers and agitators" was the classification given the quartet not listed as officials. William E. Boyd, Evanston attorney, reputed millionaire, probably was the most prominent of those indicted. His indictment followed newspaper interviews in which he was quoted as having said he was the "reddest of the reds." He is sergeant-at-arms of the communist labor party of America.

Others included in the indictments were John Reed, New York, editor of the Voice of Labor; August Wagnack, New York, national executive secretary; Margaret Perry, Akron, Ohio, delegate to the national convention; Charles Baker, Cleveland, Ohio, "active organizer and agitator."

WILL FIGHT "MOONSHINERS"

Revenue Agent to Send Force Into West Virginia Hills.

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., January 22.—Receipt of evidence that moonshining activities in the mountains of southern West Virginia have increased since the dawn of national prohibition brought the announcement today from G. C. Holt, internal revenue agent, that he has formulated plans for an extensive campaign against liquor law violators. Holt is on duty, and he said a force of 100 men, drawn from the Columbus, Ohio, training "school" for prohibition officers, reported today to Holt for duty, and he said a force to go into the hills and wage war on illicit makers of whiskey.

James Rogers of Morgan's Men Dies GREENWOOD, S. C., January 22.—James Rogers, seventy-five, reputed to have been at the head of every raid by Morgan's men during the civil war, has died in a hospital here. He was a native of Kentucky.

WAREHOUSE TO REPLACE CENTURY-OLD LANDMARK

NEW YORK, January 22.—Old St. John's Chapel, in Varick street, a landmark in downtown New York for more than a century, will soon give way to the march of business and be replaced by a \$2,000,000 warehouse. The building and site were purchased yesterday from the Trinity Church Corporation.

When the chapel was erected by Trinity parish before 1830 and 1807 the lot was just beginning to be fashionable for homes. In the last two decades the Corinthian columns with its massive Corinthian columns and quaint spire, has been surrounded by factories and tenements, and the corporation was reduced to such proportions that the church authorities decided to close the chapel.

DENIES DEMOCRATS SEEK \$20,000,000 FOR CAMPAIGN

Chairman Cummings Writes New York Paper as to Statements Such Fund Planned.

Chairman Cummings of the democratic national committee has made public a letter to the editors of the New York Tribune denying statements in that newspaper that the committee planned to raise a fund of \$20,000,000 for this year's presidential campaign. "No such fund is being raised," Cummings said. "The chairman of the democratic national committee or any one else is not authorized to speak for the financial department of the committee made any statement indicating that it was the purpose of the democratic national committee to raise a fund of \$20,000,000 for this year's presidential campaign."

"Such a fund could not be raised, and could not be properly used if raised," Cummings said. "It is very likely that effective campaign work will be more extensive this year than during any previous year in our political history. This will be due not only to the voting population, but also because of the enormous increase in the number of the democratic party through popular subscriptions. I see nothing improper in financing the campaign of a political party through popular subscriptions, but such work through the contributions of a few."

JENKINS CASE SETTLED, REPORT IN MEXICO CITY

MEXICO CITY, January 22.—The newspaper Excelsior quotes Hilario Medina, secretary of foreign affairs, as saying that the case of W. C. Jenkins, American consular agent at Puebla, has been settled satisfactorily. No details of the alleged settlement are available here.

N. Y. NAVY CLUB OPENED.

Building to Be Home for Blue-jackets on Shore Leave.

NEW YORK, January 22.—New York city's navy club, where blue-jackets and marines will have a home when on shore leave, was formally "put into commission" last night. Rear Admiral James H. Glennon and Rear Admiral Bradley Fiske, retired, presided at the opening of the new home on behalf of service men. The building was donated by a volunteer patriotic committee which raised the funds for its establishment and endowment as a "permanent memorial to the United States Navy."

The club, which is centrally located and equipped with up-to-date conveniences, succeeds the war time navy club building, which accommodated more than 200,000 sailors and marines during the war.

ENCOURAGE PUPILS TO FOLLOW NEWS

Washington Bureaus Operate to Send Geographic Bulletins to Schools.

A government department and a world-famous scientific body have paid high tribute to the value of more general newspaper reading by public school pupils, in making available for school use the Geographic News Bulletins which appear in The Star and about 500 other principal newspapers of this country.

Many teachers have written that the daily bulletins of the National Geographic Society would be of permanent value if they could be had in convenient form for classroom use and permanent filing. Responding to this demand, the Geographic News Bureau, a part of the interior, and the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic Society have arranged for the printing and distribution of the bulletins. They may be had, upon written request, through the bureau of education, Washington, D. C.

Link History With News.

The bulletins relate to the geographical and historical backgrounds of the principal events of the day's news. They will continue to appear first in The Star. After such appearance they will be printed in sets of five or six and sent, without charge, to teachers who request them. The interest in which the bulletins are useful to schools is based, the National Geographic Society states, on the fact that the time to interest a boy or girl in the Kurus, or Fuzme, or Mexico is when these places or peoples figure in the daily newspapers.

In its official publication, "School Life," a bureau of education statement said, "this arrangement has been made by the bureau and the society because these bulletins are considered one of the most valuable outside aids the teacher and pupil can have in their study of geography, history, literature and the languages. Not only do present conditions afford a peculiarly opportune occasion for better teaching of geography, but for enriching the teaching of other subjects mentioned."

How to Obtain Bulletins.

In regard to the method of obtaining the bulletins, the statement says: "The bulletins prepared by the National Geographic Society for the use of schools are issued in sets of five or six, and the set will be sent weekly to schools upon written request to the bureau of education, Washington, D. C."

Teachers may apply individually, principals may apply for copies necessary for teachers (not for individual pupils) and for their school library."

NEW YORK, January 22.—A stray tomcat projected himself into the annual poultry show progress yesterday in Madison Square Garden and had a \$100 breakfast on two carrier pigeons on exhibition by a Baltimore fancier. The homeless feline squeezed into the garden in some unknown way and feasted his eyes on the 14,000 birds, finally tearing the muslin slips of the crate housing the pigeons. Only a few feathers were left to tell the tale. The cat escaped.


