HERE TO ARRANGE FOR ENCAMPMENT

Officers of Veterans of Foreign Wars Confer With Commissioners.

Officers of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, including Commander-in-Chief F. Warner Karling, were in Washington yesterday to confer with the District Commissioners and local members of the order relative to the twenty-first annual encampment of the veterans, which will be held in this city this year.

The exact date of the encampment is to be fixed by the national council of the order, which will meet in New York next week, but the time probably will be in August or early in September. The Washington delegation to the encampment at Providence, R. I., last year obtained the encampment for this city over strong opposition by other contestants, and it is believed the coming gathering will eclipse any former encampment.

Local Leaders Aiding. Edward H. Hale, commander of National Capital Post, No. 127, and J. A. Leavens, commander of Equality Post, No. 284, both of Washington, are cooperating with the national officers in arranging accommodation for the visitors. There are 1,500 members of the order in the District of Columbia and two new posts are in process of organization.

In addition to Commander Karling the committee on arrangements, which conferred with the Commissioners, includes Jack Singer, senior vice commander-in-chief of the order; Edward T. Grant, personal aid; R. E. Newell, past commander-in-chief; Charles E. Longden and John J. McGrane, Robert G. Woodside, chief of staff, is in charge of arrangements for the parade, which will be one of the principal features of the encampment.

While in Washington Commander Karling, in company with Bertram E. Snodgrass of Washington, chairman of the national legislative committee, will call on members of Congress to discuss pending legislation of interest to former service men. The order has announced itself in favor of the Royal C. Johnson back-pay bill, the land and homes bill, combining the features of the Mondell and Morgan bills, the Spanish War Veterans pension measure and legislation affecting the Philippine Scouts.

WHITE MAN MUST AID RACE UNION, ASSERTED

Gov. Bickett Addresses Tuskegee Negro Conference; Frank Discussion Urged.

TUSKEGEE INSTITUTE, Ala., January 23.—That the search for right race relations and the burden of bringing both races together in the south rests upon the white man to point the way to the negro, was declared by Gov. Thomas Bickett of North Carolina, addressing the twenty-ninth annual Tuskegee negro conference here yesterday.

"The white man owes it to his own traditions, to his own self-respect and to his own self-preservation to guarantee to the negro the fullest protection of the law," Gov. Bickett declared. "The south in denying to the negro any participation in the making and in the administration of the law makes him in a very sacred sense the maker of the law."

Declaring that it takes time and patience to work out reforms, the North Carolina governor appealed to negroes to remember the words of Booker T. Washington, "when he said 'we ought not to allow our grievances to overshadow our opportunities.'"

Bishop George W. M. Clinton of Charlotte, N. C., declared that the chief cause of unpleasant race relations is a lack of mutual understanding due to a failure of men to discuss their race differences in a frank and dispassionate manner.

Russian Symphony. The Russian Symphony Orchestra of New York, Modest Aitschuler, conductor, delighted a representative audience of music lovers at the Metropolitan Theater yesterday afternoon. Miss Katie Bonn, pianist, was the soloist of the afternoon.

Kalinnikoff's "Symphony in G Minor" showed the Russian Symphony Orchestra at its best in one of the most musically symphonies heard in Washington in a long time. The Russian orchestra is not as large numerically, as some of the other organizations heard here, but certainly none of them could have exceeded it in grace with which it played the essentially graceful Kalinnikoff symphony.

Many in the audience found Spendiarrow's symphonic tableaux, "The Three Palms," very pleasing. It was of the latter type of "program music," in no place offending the common sense of its hearers, but proving at all times thoroughly logical. Even the representation of the blow which felled Tchaikowsky's dances from the "Nutcracker Suite" consisted of five dances. The last dance, "Sugar Plum Fairy," was given as a celeste solo by Miss Bacon.

McKean to Oppose Asquith. LONDON, January 22 (by the Associated Press).—As a result of the acceptance by former Premier Asquith of an invitation to contest the seat in parliament for Paisley, the coalitionists have reconsidered their previous decision as to their candidate. At a meeting in Paisley tonight they selected James McKean to run in their behalf.

Winnipeg Newspapers Resume. WINNIPEG, January 22 (by the Associated Press).—Winnipeg's three daily newspapers, which have been suspended for several days for lack of paper, will resume publication tomorrow as single sheets.

FAR EAST IN 1904 WORRIED KAISER

Letters to Czar Touch on Japanese and Chinese Conditions.

The German kaiser in 1904 was much perturbed over conditions in the far east and he revealed his feelings in the letters to Czar Nicholas, which were copied in Moscow by Isaac Don Levine and brought to this country. In one letter he writes:

"The officers in command of my troops in China have been for a long time already ordered closely to survey the intercourse between Japs and Chinese military and the growing influence of Japan with the Chinese army. Two days ago I got a report that the Japs are clandestinely arming the Chinese behind your and my backs against me that they have concluded a secret engagement with China to provide the army with 20,000 new repeating rifles and ammunition, forty-eight field guns and twelve mountain guns (rapid firing) with ammunition for the same. The Chinese troops are drilling day and night. And as the people who watched them, I believe, are not to be allowed to have Japs in their army. They are sure to raise Chinese hopes and inflame their hatred against the white race in general and constitute a grave danger to our commerce. That is why I have sent you a copy of the 'Marine Handelschau' with an article about 'Ironclad Cruisers' written by L. This is a book under which I hide myself for I wrote it, but nobody has a blessed notion except Tirpitz. As material for my article—written in November—I managed to get very interesting details about 'Rivadaria' and 'Moreno'—now presented to Japan by England—who were then building for Argentina. These plans, which are quite confidential and were submitted to me by express permission of the President of the Argentinian Republic, were sent me by Amalio. As the ships may interest you, I send you the atlas, for your personal use. I think the ships a perfect type of ironclad cruisers because they manage to get much into a small tonnage, 'multum in parvo.' They cost 15,000,000 francs each, which is not much. May your men not have to fight against them; it is, indeed, a great pity you did not buy them. The paper cutting shows you what a certain people call neutrality."

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"I can well imagine how sore at heart you must feel that all your plans to secure peace were of no avail. But, on the other hand, this gives you a good conscience and a clear eye, too, which allows a man—as I often say—to march to the fray without knapsack or impediments. It seems that heaven—on whose help and will we both rely—has willed that it should be so. Then you must look upon the events in the light of a trial for yourself and your country, which is to enable you and them to show and develop all the great qualities which are dormant in the Russians, which they already once proved in the great times of the first years of the nineteenth century."
