



KING PAYS TRIBUTE TO GEN. GORGAS

Sends Message to Deceased Officer's Widow—Plans for London Funeral.

LONDON, July 6.—Mrs. Gorgas, widow of Maj. Gen. William C. Gorgas, former surgeon general of the United States Army, today received condolences from King George. The king lauded Gen. Gorgas' public services.

Newton D. Baker, United States Secretary of War, on behalf of the American government and the Cuban, Peruvian and Ecuadorian governments and many persons prominent in the official and professional world sent expressions of sympathy to Mrs. Gorgas.

Peru Regrets Loss.
LIMA, Peru, July 5.—President Leguia said today that Peru suffered a heavy loss through the death of Maj. Gen. William C. Gorgas, former surgeon general of the United States Army, who recently signed a five-year contract to direct sanitary measures in Peru. Gen. Gorgas had expected to devote several months of each year to Peruvian sanitation.

"Gen. Gorgas' death means a great loss to humanity, and especially to Peru, which was fortunate enough to secure his invaluable services in the direction of the \$15,000,000 sanitation project recently inaugurated," President Leguia declared. "To us the death of this great servant of civilization is not only a keen personal loss, but also a heavy loss to the nation."

Military Honors at Funeral.
Full military honors will be accorded at the funeral of Maj. Gen. William C. Gorgas, who died early yesterday. The funeral will be held Friday noon in St. Paul's Cathedral.

There will be in attendance representatives of King George and the royal family and of the British and American armies and navies, and a delegation of the Royal Society of Medicine. The services are being arranged by this last named organization.

The body of Gen. Gorgas will be sent to the United States on a government transport, sailing either July 11 or 12. Mrs. Gorgas and Mrs. Noble will accompany the body of Gen. Gorgas home. Brig. Gen. Robert E. Noble, who had been in command of the expedition during the illness of Gen. Gorgas, will head the mission to West Africa. Many messages of condolence are reaching London.

Secretary Baker's Eulogy.
Tribute to the life and achievements of Maj. Gen. William C. Gorgas, who died Saturday in London, was paid by Secretary Baker in the following statement:

"The death of Maj. Gen. Gorgas closes a career of great distinction. The work of Gen. Gorgas in the Canal Zone made the completion of the canal possible and saved thousands of lives. It would be impossible even to estimate the lives saved by his subsequent pursuit of yellow fever prevention. His work has practically made an historic disease of what was once a virulent plague. Although a physician and scientist, Gen. Gorgas was in every sense a soldier. Military men and military things had his sympathetic interest, and he carried over into his scientific and humanitarian pursuits the zeal and courage of the soldier. He was courteous, high-minded, scholarly and zealous, and the withdrawal of his fine enthusiasm is a distinct loss to modern medicine, just as his great career is an inspiration to doctors and soldiers alike."

FORMS DEFENSE COUNCIL.

Polish Diet Votes Full Military Power to Organization.

WARSAW, July 1 (By the Associated Press).—Supreme power in the government of Poland and full military authority has been vested in a national council of defense created by the Polish diet today.

The council is composed of President Pilsudski, chairman; Gen. Leszinski, minister of war; Stanislaw Haller, chief of staff; M. Trompowski, president of the diet; Premier Grabski, three members of the cabinet and nine leaders of the diet.

Formation of this council was decided upon owing to the menace of the bolshevik invasion of Galicia and the Ukraine.

ALBANIAN ARMY FIGHTS WITHOUT ANY EXPENSE

But Defense of Avlona Costs Italians Millions Each Week.

HEADQUARTERS OF ALBANIAN ARMY, at Dracsovitza, July 6.—The world, which has seen every sort of military formation in the past five years, never saw a stranger army than this which is now attacking Avlona.

The writer had his first glimpse of this army while riding along a road in the Shushitza valley under the guns of the Italian fort at Kanina. Here some thirty men were lying under a tree, munching hunks of yellow bread. They wore frayed shirts opened at the neck, tattered trousers, some having worn-out shoes and the others having only burlap wrapped around their feet. Their guns were stacked up against the tree. This was the Albanian army at lunch. All through the mountains and along the roads leading to Avlona similar groups are prepared to repel an Italian advance.

Get Meat on Hoof.

Though the defense of Avlona is costing the Italians millions of dollars a week, the attack is costing the Albanians not a cent. The soldiers are volunteers and their food consists only of mutton and bread, which are supplied by the villagers, according to a pre-arranged ration. There are no transportation charges, for the "muttons"

transport themselves on the hoof, driven by a shepherd boy, and the bread is carried by the soldiers' wives. The animals are brought alive to the front lines and there are skinned and roasted whole on spits over a wood fire, then carved with bayonets and eaten with the fingers.

As for munitions for this army, they were captured from the Italians. The Albanians are in high spirits. When a shell explodes nearby Capt. Kempi leaps to his feet and solemnly exclaims, "Saluto, Marconi!" Then he squats once more under the tree and

rolls another cigarette. A scout reports an airplane coming, and instantly everybody from the general to the boy who sweeps out the headquarters grabs a rifle and draws a sight on the new bird as though it were some rare mallard duck. Presently the whole hillside is rattling with rifle fire. Three Italian planes were recently brought down by rifle shots, and the writer saw one huge hydroplane which was brought down from a height of more than 1,000 yards. Now the Italian planes do not fly low and their bombs rarely hit anything.
