GREAT 'DRUG RING' IS UNEARTHED BY REVENUE AGENTS

Alleged Confession of Man
Held in Chattanooga Tells
of Widespread Traffic.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., August 14.—
A colossal scheme to smuggle narcotic
drugs into the United States is believed
to have been unearthed here through
the arrest by officers of the internal
revenue department of a man giving
his name as M. C. Johnson and his
home in Alabama, being valued at
more than \$100,000, being found in the
suit case of the prisoner.

Before making the arrest the officers
contracted with Johnson to purchase
ten ounces of the drug for \$50, they
having approached him at the terminal
station and signified their desire to ac-
quire a supply of drugs.

After being locked up Johnson sent
for the officers and is said to have
made a confession and signed an affi-
davit revealing the source of the heret-
ofore mysterious supply of narcotics
with which Atlanta, Memphis, Louis-
ville, Knoxville, Chattanooga and other
cities have been flooded for several
months.

Prominent physicians, druggists and
"men in the know" in many southern
cities were named by Johnson as being
connected with the illegal drug traffic,
along with details of the workings of
the gang of smugglers it is said.

While the officers of the revenue de-
partment decline to make any of the
revelations they admit that, fol-
lowing the arrest of Johnson, agents
were dispatched to Memphis and a man
reported to be connected with the
illegal traffic was taken into cus-
tody along with a quantity of drugs.

The affidavit of Johnson, it is re-
ported, lists the names of the sources
supplying the drug, those who dis-
pose of it in this country and the
manner in which it is brought across
the border.

Names of all these men are with-
held by the revenue officers and sev-
eral more important arrests are ex-
pected soon, it being stated that in-
dividuals in Memphis, New Orleans,
Atlanta, Louisville and other cities are
now under surveillance.

MIND WAS BLANK, SAYS J. J. MCGRAW

Tells District Attorney He
Knows Nothing of How
Actor Was Assaulted.

NEW YORK, August 14 (by the As-
sociated Press).—John J. McGraw,
manager of the New York Giants,
today told the district attorney's
office his mind was "blank" as to how
John C. Slavin, musical comedy actor,
received a fractured skull while in
his company early last Sunday morn-
ing.

McGraw, who left the Lambs' club-
house with Slavin and a former naval
officer after it is alleged, he had en-
gaged in fist fights with William
H. Boyd, another actor, declared he
was unable to say how Slavin came
to be found lying in front of the Mc-
Graw home unconscious.

Mind Blank Until Monday.
"From the moment I was struck by
Boyd until Monday morning, my mind
was a blank," declared McGraw to
Assistant District Attorney Unger,
who today was admitted to the
McGraw home to examine the base
ball man, now under a physician's
care.

FATHER OF GRACE LUSK WORKS FOR HER RELEASE

Wisconsin Teacher, Sentenced for
Murder, Suffers From Wounds
and Serious Illness.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., August 14.—
Dr. A. P. Lusk of Mosinee, Wis.,
father of Grace Lusk, the Waukesha
school teacher who was sentenced on
June 21, 1917, to fifteen years' im-
prisonment at Waupun prison for the
murder of Mrs. David Roberts, as the
sequel of a love triangle, began steps
today to secure a commutation of her
sentence.

In a letter to the Milwaukee Sentin-
inel Dr. Lusk stated that unless his
daughter is given her liberty soon she
will not live long. He said she was
suffering from wounds inflicted
on herself and that she was an attack
of neuritis, experienced during her at-
tendance at the state university, was
according to her entire system in her
confinement in prison and that she is
becoming practically helpless.

The members of the state board of
control, as well as the officers of the
prison, are in favor of clemency for
his daughter. Dr. Lusk states, as she
is now rated a model prisoner.

Dr. David Roberts, the third person
in the triangle, was sentenced to the
house of correction for one year for
his part in the affair.

ESCAPES AS BOYS FIGHT.

Robert Miller Leaves House of De-
tention Via Window.

Robert H. Miller, fifteen years old,
of 1702 1/2 Half street southwest,
escaped yesterday afternoon from the
house of detention while the atten-
tion of the guard was attracted to a
fight between two colored boys in an
adjacent room. He was still at large
at a late hour last night.

Young Miller, who was charged with
possessing a pistol at his home and
frightening his mother, had been
given permission to leave his room to
get a drink of water. The fight en-
sued as the door to Miller's room
was opened, and it is stated, the
young prisoner slipped to the lower
floor unobserved. There he removed a
screen from a window and escaped.

Miller was rescued from James
Creek canal Friday afternoon.

CHARGE LIQUOR CARRYING

Officers Arrest Charles E. Holle,
Capitol Heights Truck Owner.

Charles Ellsworth Holle, resident of
Capitol Heights, Prince Georges coun-
ty, Md., was arrested yesterday by
Prohibition inspectors George W.
Hardy and Detectives Evans and San-
ders, and charged with transporting
whisky in violation of the prohibi-
tion law.

Holle is the owner of a motor truck,
according to the officers, and it is
charged the truck was employed in
the hauling of 238 cases of whisky
from a house at Bradbury Heights to
a place the location of which has not
been located by police.

The whisky was shipped to Roy C.
Allen to be delivered at a hotel on
Pennsylvania avenue, where the
room it was taken to Bradbury
Heights instead, it is charged, and
from there taken elsewhere.

DISABLED TRUCK ROBBED OF 125 CASES OF WHISKY

Four Armed Men Hold Up Ship-
ment From Baltimore
to Newark.

BALTIMORE, Md., August 14.—A
motor truck loaded with whisky was
held up by four armed men early to-
day near Fullerton, Md., and 125 cases
of the liquor carried off in another
truck by the robbers, according to
the driver of the looted truck, Fred
Skion of Newark, N. J. Later four
men were arrested here, charged with
larceny of the liquor which was the
property of the Zucker-Stelner Com-
pany of Newark, N. J. The police
said that three cases of the whisky
had been recovered.

Skion, accompanied by a negro help-
er, was on his way to Newark from
Baltimore with the whisky, when his
machine became disabled last night
near Fullerton.

OPINION INTERESTS MANY.

Demand for Maryland Ruling on
Volstead Law Enforcement.

BALTIMORE, August 14 (Special).—
Since rendering an opinion that the
police of the state were without au-
thority to make arrests for violation
of the Volstead act Attorney General
Armstrong has been swamped with
requests from all over the country for
copies of the opinion, and copies have
already been sent into thirty different
states.

One request came from the prosecu-
ting attorney of a town in Minne-
sota, who, in commenting on the
opinion, concurred with Mr. Armstrong
and also made a point himself, stating
that he did not think Congress had
the power to confer authority on
state courts that they do not possess."

U.S. APPEALS IN WOOLEN CASE

The government filed appeals in the
Supreme Court yesterday from federal
court decrees granting injunctions re-
turned in New York against the Amer-
ican Woolen Company charging viola-
tions of the laws for control acts in
dismissing the indictment. The lower
court sustained the company's contentions
that the regulations provided for
in the act did not apply to cloth be-
fore it was made up into clothing.

Bandits Attack Woman Carrying \$1,500 Pay Roll

PHILADELPHIA, August 14.—
Held up by two armed bandits,
Pauline Rivinsky, twenty-two-
year-old book-keeper, fought
desperately to retain possession
of an envelope containing \$1,500
of her employer's pay roll
money which she had just
drawn from bank. She was
thrown to the street and the
money wrested from her hands.
Hundreds of pedestrians stood
by. The bandits jumped into a
stolen motor car and dashed
through crowded streets, close-
ly pursued.

They lost control and crashed
into an elevated railway pillar,
wrecking the machine. They
got away, but the money was
recovered.

MUCH WHISKY SHIPPED.

Four Carloads Daily Express
Record at Louisville.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., August 14.—
Shipment from Kentucky of whisky
in carloads by express has increased
rapidly in the last three months, ac-
cording to B. C. Hemming, chief
clerk to J. K. Shannon, superintendent
of the American Railway Express
Company.

Mr. Hemming said today that since
May 2 last, express shipments of
whisky from Louisville have aver-
aged four carloads daily. From May
5 to July 26, he said, 160 carloads
left here, and from August 6 to to-
day, 30 cars. Ninety per cent of the
whisky, he added, was consigned to
eastern cities.

These figures do not include ship-
ments in lots of less than a carload,
said Mr. Hemming.

BERGAMIN QUILTS IN SPAIN.

MADRID, August 13.—Francisco Ber-
gamín, minister of the interior, has re-
signed, the governor of Madrid told
newspaper men today.

that Senor Bergamin has opposed the
position taken by the cabinet relative
to the news print paper question.
