GENOA POLICE TRAIL GANG OF TERRORISTS

Find in Livery Stable Bombs Similar to Those Exploded in Stock Exchange.

GENOA, Italy, September 18 (by the Associated Press).—Two high-explosive bombs similar to the one that exploded in the stock exchange here on Friday have been found by the police in a livery stable, but so far the persons who hid them there have not been discovered. The authorities are closely following every clue, feeling they may arrest the perpetrators of the outrage and possibly reveal an international terrorist plot, which may, perhaps, extend to the United States.

Six Hungarians have been arrested here since the explosion of the bomb. They had plenty of money, but none of them had identification papers. They are said to be communists and were taken into custody at a hotel alleged to be a rendezvous for radicals. Several Russians and Hungarians, who were held as suspicious characters, were found there recently.

Police officials have ascertained the bomb had been made recently, and for this reason, there is some suspicion that it was turned out by a plant occupied by workmen. Attempts have been made to blow up several fashionable restaurants, one of which was livery stable, in the neighborhood of the stock exchange building.

LONDON, September 19.—Three persons have been killed and six injured as a result of an explosion in the Ionifolo powder factory at Mantua, says a Rome dispatch to the Exchange Telegram Company. The explosion, which damaged several houses, is believed to have been caused deliberately by parties unknown.

SAYS HE ENTERTAINED AS MATTER OF COURTESY

Democratic Leader Scoffs Criticism of Greeting to Legislators Who Bolted Suffrage.

ATHEENS, Ala., September 20 (by the Associated Press).—Addressing an open letter to Mrs. A. J. Bowron, a well known suffragist of Birmingham, who sought an explanation of his part in entertaining the bolting Tennessee legislators while they were in Alabama in August, W. Sanders, democratic national committeeman, replied that he had no apologies to make and that his participation in the entertainment was a matter of courtesy to the visitors and as an individual rather than an official.

No Terrors in Threat.

The letter, a lengthy one, which was issued without a copy of the questionnaire, takes note of a statement that he is a marked man hereafter, and the committeeman asserted that it held no terrors for him, as he had no political ambitions, but in the event he did seek public office he would unhesitatingly carry this issue before both male and female voters of the state.

Reaffirms His Opposition.

Mr. Sanders reaffirmed his opposition to woman suffrage and declared his opinion to be that it would encourage sex antagonism rather than sex deference. He honored the men of Tennessee who acted to uphold a vital provision of their constitution, and prophesied that the next federal amendment would be one similar to the Tennessee provision relating to the ratification of amendments by legislatures only after they had been elected with such amendments a campaign issue.

KING TO VISIT PREMIER.

MADRID, September 19.—It was announced today that King Alfonso is going to visit Premier Dato at his country house in Llodio, where it is probable the political situation will be discussed. The opinion is held in political circles that the premier will ask the monarch for a decree dissolving the parliament, which will mean general elections this fall.

The members of the cabinet decline to discuss the matter.

Favorite Mare Mourns Death of Walter Winans

LONDON, September 20.—The E.R. favorite trotting mare of Walter Winans, the American sportsman, who died while driving a horse in a race here recently, is said by Winans' stablemen to have grieved so much since her master's death that she became almost unmanageable.

"Mr. Winans always used to visit her first and feed her with sugar and talk to her, and she was always the first to be harnessed for a run round the track," said W. Mills, who has been the dead man's groom of twenty-nine years.

"Mr. Winans fed the mare himself," Mills continued. "On the day of the death I think the mare must have seen her master carried in after the accident. That afternoon the men could do nothing with her. She refused food and kept on kicking at the door of her box. The next day when I took her out for exercise she neighed the whole time."

"Finally, we had to shut her up for a day or two in the dark and now she has become a little quieter."

HOLD FUNERAL SERVICES FOR EXPLOSION VICTIMS

Rites Here for Worth Bagley Ellsworth, at Savannah for Col. Neville.

Funeral services for Worth Bagley Ellsworth, twenty-one years old, who was one of the two Washingtonians killed in the bomb explosion in Wall street, New York, last Wednesday, were held today at his late residence, 1248 Girard street. Interment was made in Glenwood cemetery.

Several hours after he had been struck by falling rock in the explosion, young Ellsworth died in Broad Street Hospital, New York. He was returning to Washington from a vacation in the Adirondacks. He was a Central High school graduate and was one of the most popular young men of his class. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Goodwin D. Ellsworth, and one brother, Goodwin D. Ellsworth, Jr.

Col. Charles Neville, head of a New York accounting firm, with offices in the Southern building, this city, will be buried, today in Bonventura cemetery, Savannah, Ga., his home city. Col. Neville also lost his life in the New York explosion. His Washington residence was in the Westmoreland apartments.

Mrs. Neville and her two children left Saturday for Savannah, where Col. Neville will be interred with full Masonic exercises.
