

COMMERCE PACT "STEP OF VALUE"

Ship Service Between U. S. and Hamburg Promised, Says Harriman.

W. Averill Harriman, president of the holding company known as the American Ship and Commerce Corporation, today made public a letter to Chairman Benson of the Shipping Board, in which he explains the purposes of an agreement entered into by his company with the Hamburg-American line, which, he says, will constitute "a step of great value and importance in the development of the American merchant marine."

Mr. Harriman says the entire outstanding stock of the American Ship and Commerce Corporation, including the Kerr Steamship Company, is held by American citizens, and that no foreign money has entered into the agreement between his company and the Hamburg-American line.

U. S. and Hamburg Service Planned.

He says it is the intention of the American Ship and Commerce Corporation to inaugurate a service between the United States and Hamburg ports of high-type combination first, second and steerage passenger and cargo steamers, to be built in American yards, and that Chairman Benson of the Shipping Board has expressed sympathy with the idea of some such working agreement with the Hamburg-American line as has been consummated.

The American company has secured the services of a Mr. Siegel, an American citizen, who formerly operated with the Hamburg-American line. He is said to have severed his connection with the latter line and has entered the employ of the American Ship and Commerce Corporation.

Original Agreement Changed.

Several changes in the actual contract between the American Ship and Commerce Corporation and the Hamburg-American line have been made since the original agreement was entered into, Mr. Harriman says. When details have been fully arranged, the full text of the agreement will be made public.

The name of the Livermore-Deerborn Company, Inc., agents for the Shawmut Steamship Company, operating shipping lines to Mediterranean and far eastern ports, has been changed to the United American Line, Inc., and will be operated on and after October 22 under the latter name.
