

"UNDERGROUND PARTY" BELIEVED DISCOVERED

Many Members of Communists Thought to Have Gone Over to Secret Organization.

CHICAGO, November 22.—The first "underground party" that the United States has ever seen is now believed to be operating, according to Edward J. Brennan, division superintendent of the bureau of investigation of the Department of Justice here.

"It appears that the members of a great majority of them to the communist parties have gone over to a united communist party that seems to be maintaining a secrecy never before attempted by an American radical organization.

"These people appear to be holding meetings with the utmost secrecy with which they can surround them. Names used appear fictitious.

"The Russian element, which formed the backbone of the original communist party, appears to be in control and to have the bulk of the membership of the new secret organization.

"Literature is frequently distributed without any indication as to where it comes from. In order to escape detection, it appears that the party members take unusual precautions. The members are known among themselves, and literature is passed around among them, sometimes by messenger. When mailed, we know that it is done in small quantities, three or four letters or packages in a box in one corner of a city, and three or four in a box in another section.

"The party has its largest membership in Chicago and New York. In Chicago meetings have been made extra difficult by the Illinois law, which forbids renting property to an out-law organization of this character.

"Property owners who become suspicious often call us to make sure on this point.

"It is my individual conviction that the united communist party, the old communist party and kindred associations of this nature are unlawful in that they advocate the overthrow of the government by force and violence."

ONLY EUROPEAN TO GET IN DESCRIBES 'SECRET CITY'

Sheshawan, Held by Moroccans, Is Occupied by Spanish Expeditionary Force.

LONDON, November 22.—The Morocco correspondent of the Times claims to be "almost with certainty" the only living European who has hitherto visited Sheshawan, the mysterious "secret" Moroccan inland city, which is officially stated to be occupied by a Spanish expeditionary force.

Sheshawan, or more correctly Sheshawon, he writes, is a small town of a few thousand inhabitants, situated in the tribland of the Beni Zejel, about forty miles to the south of Tatan. The Times' man says he visited it in Moorish disguise in 1888 and only escaped with difficulty.

He adds that the town is small, built along a sort of terrace on the high mountain, its steepness and its surrounding gardens, Sheshawan presents no very particular features.

Its inhabitants are poor. Their industries are the making of furniture in painted wood—brackets and tables—and the weaving of woolen stuffs. They are renowned for their meanness, and a native proverb states: "If you see a Moslem merchant from Fez weeping, it is only a Moor of Sheshawan who could have got the better of him."

EAT MORE BROWN BREAD.

Chemist Says White Bread Eaters Are Close to Neuritis.

ADELAIDE, Australia, November 22.—Dr. Hargreaves, a distinguished Australian chemist, declared at a conference of master bakers here today that the nations which eat white bread were getting close to the border line of neuritis. He advocated brown bread, saying that modern science demanded that wheat should be milled whole.

He said that, undoubtedly, campaigns in favor of whole meal bread will shortly be launched in the United States and England, and it behooved Australia to take prompt action.

The members of the conference agreed with the doctor's observations, but said that Australians, with the exception of cranks and dyspeptics, refused to eat brown bread.

RECOVERY OF MAN'S 'LOST CHAPTERS' WITHIN REACH

CHICAGO, November 22.—Recovery of the "lost chapters in the career of man" hidden in the ancient buried cities of western Asia is an immense possibility and an American responsibility, Dr. James Henry Breasted of the University of Chicago reports. Dr. Breasted, who is professor of Egyptology and oriental history there, has recently returned from a survey of most of the important buried cities of the near east.

The collapse of the Ottoman empire has opened the birth-lands of civilization to unrestricted investigation. Dr. Breasted said: "It is evident," he added, "that there lies before us an opportunity unprecedented in the history of humanistic research.

"The great centers of human life in the ancient world, the mighty cities and capitals of Babylonia, Assyria, Persia, Palestine, Syria, Asia Minor and Egypt, the region where the earliest civilized societies arose out of savagery and barbarism to bring civilization to barbarian Europe—all these wonderful foundations are being which are rapidly perishing in the whole region about the eastern end of the Mediterranean lie there silently awaiting the spade of the excavator."

It will be possible to clear up the leading ancient buried cities of western Asia within the next twenty-five years or perhaps a generation, given sufficient funds and adequate personnel, according to Dr. Breasted. The task rests with American orientalist, he said, because no other country has the available resources.

ROCKEFELLER OUTFIT TURNED OVER TO FRANCE

PARIS, November 22.—The Rockefeller Foundation, which has been assisting France in its fight against tuberculosis for the last three years, has turned over to the complete control of France an elaborate anti-tuberculosis organization which has been operating in the department of Eure-et-Loir at a cost of 4,000,000 francs.

The organization, the most complete for its purpose in France, consists of twenty-four dispensaries, four complete isolation services, a departmental sanatorium and a modern departmental laboratory. In addition to this, the Rockefeller foundation has started among the children of the department an organization known as the "modern health crusaders," a system of child education, and having for its object the prevention of tuberculosis by the thorough teaching of hygiene.

Although it will not be possible to eliminate the tubercle bacillus, it will be used by the other departments of France as a general model. The Rockefeller foundation is assisting the French people in their struggle against consumption in thirty-eight of the departments of France. The work probably will continue for the next fifteen months or two years.

450,000 WITHOUT HOMES.

PARIS, November 22.—More than 450,000 Parisians are without apartments, according to the figures given in debate in the city council over the housing problem. The speakers stig-

matized the growing practice of profiteering by landlords, who, it was asserted, were putting scanty furniture in vacant apartments, charging an exorbitant rental or obliging a tenant to purchase the furniture at high prices as a condition of leasing.

The council unanimously adopted a resolution to give the name of Ventose to one of the streets of Paris.

The pay of cabinet ministers under the "Irish republican government" is fixed at \$875 a year.
