

ASK FREE OR LOWER FARE FOR STUDENTS

Park View Citizens Complete Report on Recent School Census.

Free transportation or reduced street car fares for students attending high school is advocated by a large percentage of the residents of Park View, according to the tabulated report of the results of the school census recently taken in that community. The final draft of the report was completed today by Miss Frances S. Fairley, principal of the Park View School and community secretary, who directed the work of the taking of the census, and will be submitted to the board of education at its meeting Wednesday.

Results of the census are summarized briefly as follows:

There are 1,779 families in the community, 1,571 of them born in the United States.

There are 1,851 mothers, 1,459 of them born in the United States.

Seventy-one and eighty-eight of the residents of the community, or about 25 per cent, are qualified to vote.

Of the 1,651 mothers only 167 are forced to work outside their homes.

The number of domestic employees and number of mechanics in the community are about equally divided.

Unemployment in the community is slight.

There are 1,030 children crowded into the Park View School, which was originally built to accommodate 640. For every 100 children graduating from the Park View School next year there are 130 ready to enter.

Of the 1,284 children of school age in the community forty-five attend private or parochial schools.

There are 1,779 families, 1,211 with their homes.

There are 1,611 fathers living in the community, 1,351 of them born in the United States.

There are 1,651 mothers, 1,459 of them born in the United States.

Seventy-one and eighty-eight of the residents of the community, or about 25 per cent, are qualified to vote.

Of the 1,651 mothers only 167 are forced to work outside their homes.

The number of domestic employees and number of mechanics in the community are about equally divided.

Unemployment in the community is slight.

There are 1,030 children crowded into the Park View School, which was originally built to accommodate 640. For every 100 children graduating from the Park View School next year there are 130 ready to enter.

Of the 1,284 children of school age in the community forty-five attend private or parochial schools.

There are 1,779 families, 1,211 with their homes.

The report pointed out that a number of families in Park View told the enumerators that they had children ready to enter school, but could not send them, due to the lack of accommodations in the Park View School. The parents also, according to the report, expressed their approval of the two-plateau system in operation at the Park View School, but voiced disapproval of the use of the three frame portable buildings.

HAWAII IS PROSPEROUS.

Gov. McCarthy Reports to Secretary of the Interior.

General conditions throughout the territory of Hawaii have been exceedingly prosperous, Gov. J. McCarthy of Hawaii says in his annual report to the Secretary of the Interior, made public today.

Aborigines and Hawaiians of mixed blood number about 40,000, the report says. Gov. McCarthy urges enactment of the Hawaiian rehabilitation act, which is planned to put the natives back on the land and prevent their extinction.

ARMY MEN DISCREDIT WILLERS' SPY STORY

Former Captain Held Incommunicado as Deserter. But May Not Face Trial as Traitor.

NEW YORK, December 9.—The New York Times says: John A. Willers, former captain of Company K, 48th United States Infantry, and self-styled German spy, is being held incommunicado in Castle William, Governors Island. A court-martial will convene within a week to try him for alleged violation of articles of war 38 and 94. Lieut. John has been assigned to defend him. Willers, who also faces charges of desertion from the Army and embezzlement, refused to talk. Despite his picturesque story of how he and 300 other German army cadets came here in 1914 to spy, no charge of enemy activity was made against him. Army officials were inclined to discredit Willers' tale. One of the first visitors to the island was Willers' wife, a bride of four months. She was a Miss Crawford of Chicago. Mrs. Willers is about twenty-one years old, short, of dark complexion and hair, and pretty. She was agitated almost to the point of tears. "I can't believe his story is true," she said, after talking to her husband. "I met him eighteen months ago in Chicago and we were married four months ago. I noticed that he appeared to have something on his mind, but he explained that he was German born and told how while he was in the Army he had trained men to kill Germans. He was very good to me and I never had cause to doubt that what he told me was all the truth. He told me that he had been honorably discharged from the Army. I never knew that he had deserted."

POOR STREET LIGHTING CAUSE OF ACCIDENTS

Kalorama Citizens Will Call Attention of Matter to Federation.

Poor lighting of the streets of the National Capital was discussed by members of the Kalorama Citizens' Association at a meeting held at the Highlands last night. The matter will be called to the attention of the Federation of Citizens' Associations. The association endorsed the "safety first" week, and it was the consensus of opinion that the highly lighted streets, especially where gas lamps are used, are the cause of many accidents. A resolution from the North-east Washington Citizens' Association urging the formation of a public utilities commission separate from the board of Commissioners was referred to the executive committee. Resolutions of sympathy with the family of the late Maj. Guy T. Scott, a member of the association, were voted. Mrs. Anna E. Hendley called attention to the Curtis-Gard bill to regulate child labor in the District, and to another bill to better maternity conditions in the United States.

LECTURES ON CATHEDRAL.

Work on Massive Edifice May Be Resumed Soon, Says Bishop.

An illustrated lecture on the National Cathedral of St. Peter and Paul was given by Rt. Rev. Alfred Harding, Bishop of Washington, and Very Rev. G. C. F. Bratenahl at the Mason House, Tenleytown Heights. Views of the Gothic edifice in its present state and as it will appear in the future were shown by lantern slides. Bishop Harding said of the proper support is given to the project and building operations could be resumed in a few months and continued without cessation, the entire cathedral could be completed within five years. Dr. Bratenahl said the cathedral, when completed, would be about the same size as York Cathedral, England, and larger than Westminster Abbey, London.

The board's action will be taken under the merchant marine act, which permits railroads to grant lower rates to commodities transported for shipment in American vessels.

EAST WASHINGTON CITIZENS' CELEBRATE

Dr. Emmons Tells of Work of Organization During Its Fifty Years' Existence.

Absence of speechmaking characterized the fiftieth celebration of East Washington Citizens' Association held in the auditorium of Eastern High School last night. Dr. Charles M. Emmons, president of the association, told something of the work of the organization during the fifty years it has served the people of East Washington and referred to the city's development during that period. "When the association was organized," he said, "the city's population was but 75,000, and records show there was but one high school and one bank in the city. There were two police stations." During that year the sum of \$100 was appropriated to keep the streets in repair and \$700 was spent for the construction of a bridge over the canal at New Jersey avenue.
