

Maryland and Hopkins End Grid Relations : Baltimore Would Be Service Athletic Center

OLD RIVALS LIST NEW FOES FOR THANKSGIVING

Baltimoreans to Play Washington and Lee and College Park Eleven to Meet North Carolina State, Probably in Monumental City.

WHAT slight chance remained for the University of Maryland and Johns Hopkins to resume their annual foot ball duel on Homewood Field in Baltimore next Thanksgiving day apparently has been lost, according to schedule announcements made by the Baltimoreans and North Carolina State College. The Hopkins list includes a holiday game at home with Washington and Lee University, while Maryland is to be encountered by the Tarheels on the same day, probably in Baltimore.

Nine games are listed by Johns Hopkins, as follows:
October 1, Mount St. Mary's; 8, Delaware; 15, Dickinson; 22, Virginia; 29, Western Maryland.
November 5, Haverford; 12, Columbia or Swarthmore; 19, St. John's of Annapolis; 24, Washington and Lee.
North Carolina State has booked nine contests and is looking for one for September 24. Those listed are:
October 1, Navy, at Annapolis; 8, Penn State, at State College; 15, Richmond, at Raleigh; 20 (fair week), North Carolina, at Raleigh; 27, V. M. I., at Raleigh.
November 5, Davidson, at Charlotte; 11 (Armistice day), V. P. I., at Norfolk; 19, Wake Forest, at Raleigh; 24 (Thanksgiving), Maryland University (place undecided).

Eastern and Tech Basketers Lose to Steward's and A. & N.

HIGH school teams were surprised by quints representing institutions outside of the public educational system in basket ball games played yesterday. Steward's Business College, which has met defeat at the hands of several members of the High School League, suddenly came to life and nosed out Eastern in a 30-to-29 battle, while Tech, substituting St. John's College, fell before the Army and Navy Prep in a 29-to-21 engagement.

A goal from scrimmage tossed by Ingley, former Y. M. C. A. star, during an extra five minute period, topped the Capitol Hill team. Eastern came out of the first half with a 21-to-11 advantage, but Steward's scored a goal and the count knotted at 23, when the regulation game ended. Prender's goal from foul gave Eastern the point in the overtime play. Capt. Pabel of Eastern, who made five scrimmage goals, and did some accurate throwing from the foul line, was the star of the contest.
Parker and Gude, Tech's veteran guards, could not check Wise and Beall, the big Prep forwards. These shifty tossers caged 16 points for their team, and Shapley, the rangy Prep center, made four court goals and five from free throws. Aubinoe, Tech's new forward, did some good shooting, but he was accorded scant support by his mates. In a preliminary game, Tech's midgets defeated the diminutive Army and Navy team, 19 to 8.

Teams of the Georgetown Preparatory School at Garrett Park, Md., scored victories over two quints of Rockville High School. The big five won, 25 to 15, and the midgets, 35 to 19. Hamer and Dean did some strong playing for the Preps' first team, while Manners and Bennett were the Rockville mainstays.



17 MARYLAND GRIDMEN TO BE AWARDED LETTER

Rather a peculiar situation arose this fall at the University of Maryland in regard to the award of letters. The school has especially stringent rules about such awards, and when the season was summed up two days ago to determine the men eligible to vote for a captain it was found that only eight men had qualified for letters. Last year only eleven men got letters and the year before that only ten.

However, a hurried meeting of the athletic board was called and a temporary change was effected so that seventeen men are due to get their insignia tonight, the occasion of the annual Christmas dance. Fourteen members of the freshman squad will get numerals.

YALE HAS 9 GRID GAMES

List, Much Changed From This Year, Includes Maryland—Army to Visit New Haven.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., December 17.—Yale's foot ball schedule for 1921 shows several changes from those of recent years. Nine games are to be played, instead of eight, and the list gives the scene of the game with the Army as New Haven, instead of West Point, as previously announced.
Boston College, Carnegie Tech, Colgate and West Virginia are dropped as Yale opponents, and the Army and Maryland are given places.
All games are to be played in the Yale bowl except the Harvard contest.

EMMITSBURG, Md., December 17.—No Washington teams are included among the colleges to be encountered by the Mount St. Mary's basket ball quint this season. Sixteen games have been scheduled.

Harley to Coach Pitt Nine.
Dick Harley, former major league base ball player, has again been engaged to coach the Pitt nine. Pitt will meet Yale, Brown, Holy Cross and Rhode Island State on an eastern trip.

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G. U. NINE WILL BE BUSY

Twenty-Six Games Listed, Nineteen of Which Are to Be Played at Hilltop.

None of the other District college teams has a place on the twenty-six game schedule prepared for the 1921 base ball team of Georgetown University and negotiations for an engagement are under way with only one of the local field, George Washington. Representative northern and southern institutions will be encountered. Nineteen of the games are to be played on the home field.
The season will open at the Hilltop March 25, when Pennsylvania will oppose the Blue and Gray and a string of sixteen games will be disposed of before Georgetown leaves to Annapolis for a meeting with Navy, Holy Cross, Cornell, Lafayette, Georgia Tech and West Virginia are among the prominent teams scheduled.

A six-game northern trip will complete the season. This will start with a Penn game in Philadelphia May 21, and end at Boston on May 30, with the Boston College contest. Games are pending with Detroit University, Alabama, Fordham, Pittsburgh, South Carolina, Columbia and George Washington. The schedule:

STADIUM WITH 35,000 CAPACITY, CITY'S PLAN

Army, Navy and Marines in Move to Organize Gridiron Outfits to Aid Project—Recent Game There Brought Inspiration.

It may now be stated that plans are afoot to make of Baltimore the service athletic center of the country. A campaign has been inaugurated by prominent citizens of the Maryland city to build a municipal stadium with a capacity of 35,000. Here it is planned to have eleven representing the three regular services meet in an elimination series and final. As a companion plan, we have a movement in the Army, Navy and Marines to organize gridiron outfits which will be outstanding, and thus representative of each branch of the service.

Army and Navy officers who have placed foot ball at the two service academies have told the writer that no one could have asked for better or more thrilling foot ball than that played by the Quaque marines and the Great Lakes naval station team at Baltimore December 4. Great Lakes had previously won the naval station championship and the Marines had defeated the Hampton Roads outfit. Each team made a touchdown and added the one point from placement. Baltimoreans turned out in large numbers and enjoyed the spectacle hugely. In fact, it was this contest which inspired the launching of the stadium movement.

The writer had a certain amount of curiosity in following up a statement which he made on December 10, in connection with his comments upon the attitude of the West Point foot ball authorities regarding the obtaining of gridiron material. This statement was as follows:
"The Navy, in self-defense, will have to adopt this method, if she has not already done so."
I am now in a position to state that the Navy has not done and that it will not do so. In no case is a single shipman in Annapolis because he was induced or urged to come by any responsible Navy man. And there is no intention of having such students in the academy. As a matter of fact the age limit of entrance at the naval academy is under twenty, and even were the academy athletic authorities inclined to promulgate—which they are not—this alone would prevent it. Here, too, is a fact in which the great service school at Annapolis should take pride: in nearly every case where a foot ball player, or any athlete in any major sport, has reached a prominent position in the athletic world he has been developed at the United States Naval Academy, and was not a finished product upon entrance.
Wisconsin must have been in a naughtily mood in the Ohio State game, according to a man from Columbus. The Badger coach, he says, tried to browbeat the officials before the game. Groups of three and two men were sent upon Williamson at various times, until finally the Buckeye left the field. One of the Wisconsin cheer leaders greeted so palpably over the plight of the Ohio back as to have his conduct registered in the status. The coach sat on the Wisconsin bench, holding his coat in a score of different positions, apparently flushing signals, etc.
All this happening in a conference game! Impossible.
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
