## SEEKS WAR DANGER US IN A CRISIS

### British Diplomat Fears Great Powers May Be Drawn Into Balkan Struggle.

PARIS, January 15.—Sir William Goods, British member of the Austrian section of the League of Nations Commission, at a luncheon in his honor at the Renaissance Club spoke freely on the situation in Austria.

"Three eventualities must be considered as a consequence of the prospective collapse of Austria," Sir William said in part. "They are, first, an attempt on the part of the Austrian provinces to join Germany; second, partition of the Austrian provinces among the adjoining states, not excluding Germany; and third, a communist or bolshevik reign of terror."

"It has been stated that before giving up in despair the Austrian government will request the council of the league of nations, under article 80 of the treaty of Versailles, to permit a union with Germany. My opinion, however, is that Germany cannot feed the whole of Austria; but apart from that question, it is to me unthinkable that the allies could permit Germany to extend her empire to the borders of the Adriatic, with her frontiers in the rear of Czechoslovakia and on the banks of Hungary, Yugoslavia and Italy."

"The disappearance of a regular government in Austria, in the opinion of Sir William, will sow the seeds of more wars between the countries who are rivals for her remains. "A rumor is current in Austria," he said, "that Hungarian forces, regular or irregular, would advance upon Vienna on the pretense of preventing the ancient capital falling into the hands of the Czechs. In that case no one in Austria would be surprised if the Czechs attempted by force to forestall the occupier of the Czechoslovakia, under its recent defensive alliance with Czechoslovakia, might then decide to attack Hungary. The destiny of the provinces of Upper Austria, Lower Austria and Carinthia would then be the melting pot of a war of reparation from which it might be difficult for the greater powers to abstain."

## BERLIN IS EXERCISED BY EMIGRATION PLANS

### Those Leaving Germany Are From Best Class of Citizens, While Reds Remain.

BERLIN, January 15.—German emigration to Brazil, Argentina, Mexico and the United States during the first three-quarters of 1920 reached 6,010, of whom only a very few went to the United States. This is approximately twice the number of emigrants during the previous year, but a bare fraction of the number German economists and investigators predicted would emigrate.

Estimates are still being made that 5,000,000 Germans are preparing to depart, dependent, however, upon their raising the money for transportation. Most of the emigrants, it is reported, will head for Brazil, which is offering inducements for colonization purposes.

The imperial immigration board has instituted a series of lectures to inform prospective emigrants of South American conditions in detail. The first of these lectures was given at Hamburg last night to 400 men who expect to emigrate to Brazil. Official circles in Berlin apparently are much exercised over the class of persons leaving the country. The head of the consular office said: "Those leaving are from our best class of citizens; the bolsheviks, poor and ultra rich, are remaining with us. Economic conditions are forcing this situation."

The immigration officials have begun the preparation of a new law in response to demands for the regulation of the outgoing tide which, in view of the character of the emigrants, some authorities, including Dr. Max Hirsch, believe eventually will result in a weakened, probably an anemic, German race, and impaired German culture.

State aid has been suggested for the better classes who have suffered most by the economic condition, the state improvement of arid lands, which, if irrigated or drained, it is estimated, would support 10,000,000 additional farmers. The provisions being drafted in the new law are not known.

## DISTURBANCES IN INDIA QUELLED AND NINE SLAIN

### Order Restored Southwest of Lucknow—Nearly All Those Arrested Are Released by Authorities.

DELHI, India, January 13.—Order has been restored in the Rai Bareilly district, southwest of Lucknow, where rioting was recently carried on by the peasantry.

Nearly all those arrested in connection with the disturbances have been released. During the disturbances the police killed nine rioters.

A London dispatch of January 11, telling of the rioting in the Rai Bareilly district, said the cause of the trouble was reported to be the efforts of landlords to suppress a strike established by the peasants. The latter alleged they had been denied certain rights of tenancy and had been forced to submit to illegal extortions, the dispatch added.

## KILLED BY ORDER.

### Execution of Liebknecht and Rosa Luxemburg Explained.

Cross-Atlantic Cable Service to The Star. BERLIN, January 15.—The real story of the execution of Liebknecht and Rosa Luxemburg has just been told. Hans von Troschke, who arrested them in the offices of the Red Flag, told it as a witness in the case of Scheidemann vs. Prussia.

He testified that Scheidemann personally issued the order for the execution of the two revolutionaries. In December, 1918, the order had been given to the red guards to arrest and execute the two and reward the 10,000 marks and a passport to Holland had been promised the one who would red the order.

## RED-PERSIAN PACT NEAR.

### Virtual Recognition of Soviet Principles Is Provided For.

LONDON, January 15.—An agreement is under discussion between the Russian bolsheviks and Persia, by which virtual recognition of the soviet principle by Persia would be admitted, according to an authoritative statement made here today.

The soviet government agrees to cancel all of Persia's debts to Russia. Russia in return will grant Persia concessions regarding Persian roads, railways and lands and also compensate Persia for the bolshevik invasion. As the British troops in Persia are soon to begin their withdrawal, it is believed here the agreement will be given soon.

## RIOTERS DENOUNCE TAX ON WORKERS

### Mob in Front of Vienna City Hall Shouts for a World Revolution.

VIENNA, Austria, January 15.—Usually the communist or radical socialist demonstrations in Vienna are conducted in an orderly manner without rioting. The most recent one failed to observe this custom despite the warnings of the Red Flag, the communist newspaper which served as the medium for calling the demonstration. Both the social democrats and the communists are opposed to the Christian socialists, who are in charge of the government. At the same time the social democrats and the communists are opposed to each other and hence there is nothing exactly like political unity in Austria.

**Communists Oppose Tax.** The communists have adopted the position that they are entitled to be free from taxes and the demonstration was called to protest against the government's effort to collect taxes from the workers, who are about the only persons in Austria, outside the profiteers, who have money. One suggestion was that incomes under 60,000 crowns (normally \$12,000) should be free of the taxes. Under this arrangement, as the Red Flag points out, workers earning above 1,300 crowns weekly (\$260) would have to pay taxes. "Each increase of wages," it is said, "would mean more taxes."

There was no suggestion whence the government should obtain the revenues. The communists figure that they do not want a Christian social government, and hence should not pay taxes. Little realizing this, financially stable Austria would mean wages with purchasing value.

**Fierce Speeches Delivered.** About 6,000 demonstrators gathered before the city hall and listened to fiery speeches full of "Down with a forced tax! Hang the profiteers! Hurrah for the world revolution!" and so on. A resolution to fight the tax to the end was carried by acclamation. Then the demonstrators formed in line and marched along the Ring boulevard past the parliament building, where cordons of police in speck and span uniforms gave a heartening impression of order and common sense.

In the center of the city before the hotels the crowd became boisterous, howling and shouting "Hang the shysters!" for the hotels are supposed to be the cause of the economic situation in raising prices. Some windows were broken by stones thrown from slingshots.

Certain elements in the crowd were apparently bent upon pillage, for an attempt was made to traverse the shop district, where the shops were quickly put out and the window fronts were shattered, but the column turned back to the boulevard.

**Trying to Effect General Strike.** The communists are trying to influence the railroad and postal employees to join in a general strike. If the tax law is enforced, the impression is that most of the workers are forced into these demonstrations by a system which agitators have established. Indeed, many of them dropped out of the parade when near their homes.

The Christian socialist government is facing a crisis which will try its weak strength to the utmost. It will hardly dare to surrender to the workers and admit its inability to collect taxes.

## ALLIED SUPREME COUNCIL MAY NOT MEET JAN. 19

### French Cabinet Crisis Reported Cause—Hapsburg Question Believed to Be Up in Rome.

ROME, January 14.—Despite assurances to the contrary from Paris, says Epoca today, it is probable the meeting of the allied supreme council fixed for January 19 will be postponed, owing to the French cabinet crisis. The newspaper adds that for the same reason the visit to Rome of Dr. Eduard Benes, Czechoslovak foreign minister, also will be postponed, as his conference with Count Sforza, the Italian foreign minister, is to deal with subjects to be discussed by the conference in Paris.

Some of the newspapers connect the presence of the son of Archduke Joseph of Hungary in Rome and the visit of Dr. Benes with the question of restoration of the Hapsburg monarchy.

## ORDERS REDS TO LEAVE.

### Germany Resents Efforts of Agents to Induce Emigration.

LONDON, January 15.—Russian bolshevik agents who have been engaged in enlisting German workers for emigration to Russia have been ordered to leave Germany, it is said in a wireless dispatch from Berlin.

The Berlin government held that the work of these agents could not be tolerated in view of economic conditions in Russia.
