John Stanchfield Dies in New York

Lawyer Prominent in Many Famous Cases Succumbs to Kidney Trouble.

NEW YORK, June 25.—John B. Stanchfield, New York lawyer, who appeared in many important cases, died today at Islip, L. I.

Mr. Stanchfield succumbed to kidney disease after an illness of ten days. He leaves a widow, daughter and son. Mr. Stanchfield was prominent in politics as well as the law. Born in Elmira in 1845, he served as mayor of that city.

He was democratic candidate for governor in 1908 and a year later was nominated by his party for United States senator. He was delegate to the democratic national convention of 1912, which nominated Woodrow Wilson.

As head of the law firm of Stanchfield & Levy he appeared in many important cases, among which was that of the state of New York against the five socialist assemblymen ousted from the lower house last year. He was engaged by Attorney General Newton as special counsel for the assembly judicial committee, which virtually directed the case against the quintet charged with disloyalty.

Until recently he was chief counsel for Mrs. Anne L. Stillman in the defense of the divorce suit instituted by her banker husband. A short while ago, however, he withdrew from the case.

BISHOP KOUDELKA DIES.
Head of Superior Roman Catholic Diocese Had Long Illness.

SUPERIOR, Wis., June 25.—Bishop Joseph M. Koudelka, head of the Roman Catholic diocese of Superior, died yesterday after a long illness.

His father, Koudelka, was born in Chlitzow, Bohemia, December 8, 1852, and came to America sixteen years later. He was pastor of St. Prokopius parish in Cleveland.

When Bishop Horstmann of Cleveland asked for an auxiliary bishop, Bishop Koudelka was named bishop November 23, 1907. He was transferred as auxiliary to Archbishop Lillie at Milwaukee, September 4, 1911, and August 1, 1912, was appointed head of the Superior diocese.

BIGAMY BILL SIGNED.
Loophole in Connecticut Marriage Laws Is Closed.

HARTFORD, Conn., June 25.—Residents of other states already possessing a husband or wife no longer can come to Connecticut, contract another marriage and escape a charge of bigamy if they do not do so before the state Gov. Lake has signed a bill recently passed by the general assembly, making bigamy a crime, whether the couple lived together inside the state or outside.

Attention recently was called to the loophole in the Connecticut marriage law when a New York broker and New Jersey church treasurer recently took advantage of it.

TO GET RED MEN DEGREES.
MARION, Ohio, June 25.—Warrior and Chief degrees will be conferred upon President Harding at the White House on July 7 by Ohio Red Men, according to an announcement today by John L. Byers of this city, special Grand Lodge representative. President Harding is a member of the order in California, but has never received any degrees.
