

### BRENTWOOD CHARTER BILL IN LEGISLATURE

Measure Now in Hands of Those Who Represent Prince Georges County at Annapolis.

Special Dispatch to The Star. ANNAPOLIS, Md., January 27.—The delegation from Prince Georges county in the Maryland legislature has before it a bill to incorporate Brentwood in that county. It was introduced by Delegate Roberts and, up to this time, is the only bill introduced by a member of that delegation.

The proposed town limits will embrace about 400 acres situated to the north of the limits of the town of Mount Rainier, and will be divided into four wards. The officials are to be a mayor and treasurer, elected by the voters of the whole town, and four aldermen, one to be elected by each ward. It is provided that a justice, marshal, health officer and clerk shall be elected by the council.

The mayor and council are empowered to pass all ordinances for the good government, health and improvement of the town, and to preserve peace and order in it, and may levy a special tax for town improvement, not to exceed 20 cents on \$100 worth of property. A special feature in a provision for a referendum on all ordinances passed by the mayor and council.

Adjourning until Monday evening, the Maryland legislature has yet to take up any measure seriously. It is thought that in the interim every effort will be made by democratic leaders to bring those opposed to increased representation for Baltimore city into line.

A prominent delegate from the county who had been quoted against the proposal admitted today that the pressure was being brought to bear upon him and other delegates with whom he was allied. The argument is being used that the submission of a greater representation plan was a party pledge and that democrats are bound by it.

### CONFERENCE HELD HERE ON EVANGELISTIC WORK

Dr. Goodell, Dr. Helfenstein and Dr. Linefield Address Clergymen. Public Meeting Tonight.

A conference on evangelism for ministers of Washington churches is being held today at the First Congregational Church, 10th and G streets northwest, with Dr. Charles Wood, pastor of the church, the convenor and president of the Washington Federation of Churches, presiding.

Dr. Wood made a brief address in opening the sessions at 10:30 this morning. Dr. Charles L. Goodell, Dr. R. C. Helfenstein and Dr. Linefield addressed the conference. Following luncheon, which was served by the women of the church, there was an after-luncheon conference on "Evangelistic Problems of the Minister," which was led by Dr. Goodell.

Dr. Charles F. Aked is to deliver an address at 4:45 o'clock and at 6 o'clock dinner will be served by the women of the church. There will be a general conference with James L. Wilmet, director of the bureau of engraving and printing, presiding. Dr. H. F. Stillwell and Dr. Linefield will make addresses.

A mass meeting, which is open to the general public, will be held at 8 o'clock tonight, when Dr. Aked will make the principal address. Dr. Goodell also will speak.

Long Resident of Washington, Prominent in Fraternal Circles. William Harrison Tracey, resident of this city for the last thirty-six years, and well known in fraternal circles, died Wednesday at his residence, 1649 Hobart street. Funeral services were held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the residence, followed by interment at Fort Lincoln cemetery. Services were conducted under Masonic auspices.

Mr. Tracey was born March 14, 1851, in Baltimore, Md. During his residence in this city he was employed for many years as furniture salesman at Grogans. He was a member of King Solomon Daylight Lodge, Free and Accepted Masons; National Tent, No. 1, of the Order of the Macabees, and also an affiliate of the Knights of Pythias.

### ROYAL ARCH MASONS INSTALL OFFICERS

Washington Chapter Has Banquet at City Club—Presentations Made to Officials.

Following election and installation of new officers for the coming year at the Masonic Temple, Washington Chapter, No. 2, Royal Arch Masons, ended its Masonic year with a banquet, given in the blue room of the new City Club last night.

### \$100,000 FIRE NEAR NORFOLK.

NORFOLK, Va., January 27.—Damage estimated at between \$100,000 and \$150,000 was done by fire last night that consumed the acid unit of the Robertson Chemical Corporation's plant at Money Point, near Norfolk.

The unit, five acid chambers, contained in a frame and galvanized iron structure, was destroyed with its contents, more than a thousand tons of sulphuric acid, which ran into the Elizabeth river. The loss is partially covered by insurance.
