FORMER DISTRICT RECTOR INSTALLED IN NEW YORK

Rev. Caleb B. Stetson Becomes Eleventh Rector of Trinity Church.

Rev. Caleb B. Stetson, former rector of St. Mark's Episcopal Church in this city, was installed Wednesday as the eleventh rector of Trinity Church, New York city. The service was conducted by Bishop William T. Manning, whom Mr. Stetson succeeds. Right Rev. Arthur S. Lloyd and Right Rev. Herbert Shipman, suffragan bishops, were also in the church. The event set a new precedent in the annals of the 225 years' history of Trinity Church, it being pointed out by Bishop Manning that it was the first time a former rector had installed his successor, or had witnessed the institution of his successor. After the service of institution, Bishop Manning congratulated the new rector and assured him of his earnest prayers "as you enter upon this great charge, which for its opportunity for service to the church, the city and the country is in some respects without an equal."

ATTACKS DIVORCE EVIL.

Constitutional Amendment Urged to Make Laws Uniform.
Favorable action on his bill proposing a constitutional amendment providing for uniform marriage and divorce laws was urged at a hearing yesterday before the House judiciary committee by Representative Codd, republican, Michigan. The committee was told it would not be necessary to transfer jurisdiction over divorce cases to the federal courts, but Mr. Codd said that "to curb the increasing divorce evil" differences in state laws relating to the subject should be wiped out. The federal government, he held, should investigate each suit filed to determine whether there had been collusion and whether the party sued had been notified of the action.
