



### HOLD CAPITALS FAVORED BY COURTS

### Samuel Gompers Says They Are No Place for Labor Disputes.

NEW YORK, April 22.—Testifying before the Lockwood investigating committee, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, expressed a conviction that the courts should not be vested with power to review labor disputes, which result in harm to union men or to employers, "because the courts are still dominated by the ancient precept of master and servant, and constantly exercise their power to weaken organized labor."

Mr. Gompers appeared as a witness at the invitation of Samuel Untermyer, at the opening session of the committee's investigation of the \$30,000,000 Hell Gate power house project.

"Do you believe there should be a right of review vested in the courts to prevent unjust expulsion of union members?" Mr. Untermyer asked.

"God save labor from the courts," Mr. Gompers replied. "I have no faith in courts," he continued. "In deciding cases between you and me, as individuals, they are fair and impartial. But, in cases which hinge upon the relation of employer and workman, the courts are most partial and unfair. They always favor capital."

"The tendency of the last decade has been to grant more power to the courts and, where the power isn't granted, for the courts to take it. Again he said: "I'd rather allow expulsion to continue than to submit labor disputes to the courts. The courts were given jurisdiction by law over the internal affairs of a labor union, they would not be unlikely to extend their jurisdiction to include all affairs of the organization."

### THE PRINCE OF WALES BIDS TOKIO FAREWELL

Stops at Yokohama on Trip to Unveil World War Memorial.

TOKIO, April 22.—The Prince of Wales said farewell to Tokio today, leaving for Yokohama on the special train provided for his use while in Japan.

At Yokohama the royal visitor officiated at the unveiling of the bluff of the allied war memorial erected by the foreign residents of the city in honor of the men from the foreign communities in Japan, who fell during the war. The memorial is in the form of a granite gateway to the foreign cemetery, with appropriately inscribed bronze tablets.

The ceremony of unveiling was attended by a large gathering. Admiral Baron Kato represented the navy and Minister of War Yamamoto the army. The diplomatic corps, including the American ambassador, Charles E. Warren, also was present. During the ceremony George H. Scidmore, American consul general at Yokohama, fainted and was removed to his home, where he recovered.

From Yokohama the prince embarked for Enoshima en route to Enoshima and Kamakura.

### U. S. TO COMMUNICATE BY RADIO WITH SWEDEN

Direct Telegraph Exchange Between Countries, for First Time in History, to Be Established.

STOCKHOLM, April 4.—For the first time in history Sweden and the United States will have direct telegraphic communication through the erection of a high power radio station which is to be constructed immediately on the Swedish west coast. Heretofore all cable or radio communications between the two countries were relayed from London or Paris.

The rising long ago appropriated the initial sum of 2,000,000 kroner, more than \$500,000, to begin the work, but it was not until recently that the Swedish State Telegraph Board and the Radio Corporation of America reached a satisfactory agreement, under which the fees for all radio traffic will be divided equally between the two countries.

When the State Telegraph Board reported to the Swedish government that the previous obstacles in the way of building the station had been removed, contract bids were called for from the leading radio constructing companies of the world. On the basis of offers thus obtained it is calculated that the cost of the new station will not exceed 5,000,000 kroner, about \$1,400,000.

One reason strongly favoring an immediate start of work is the serious unemployment situation in Sweden. It is believed that at least \$1,000,000 will find its way into the pockets of the Swedish jobless who will be engaged in building the station.

The total telegraphic traffic between North and Central America amounted last year to 1,560,000 words. The head office of the new station will be located in Gothenburg.

### WITNESSES ARE CALLED.

Eastlake Case to Be Heard in Court Next Tuesday.

Special Dispatch to The Star. FREDERICKSBURG, Va., April 22.—Dr. J. H. DeJarnette, superintendent of the Western State Hospital at Staunton; P. H. Drewry, superintendent of the Central Hospital for the Colored Insane at Leesville; and Roger D. Eastlake, husband of the woman slain at Colonial Beach last September, have been summoned as commonwealth witnesses to appear at Montross next Tuesday, April 25, to testify against Mrs. Sarah E. Knox, charged with the murder of Mrs. Eastlake.

Mrs. Knox, who is now ill in the Richmond city jail, where she has been confined since the murder, will probably be brought to Fredericksburg by rail Monday by Sheriff Griffith of Westmoreland, and driven from here to Montross by auto.

### RAIL MERGER OPPOSED.

State of Virginia Will Protect Interest in Road. Special Dispatch to The Star. RICHMOND, Va., April 22.—Opposition to the plan to consolidate the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac railroad with any other road in the southeastern section of the country was expressed yesterday by the Virginia state corporation commission. The commission gave as its reason the fact that the state has a large interest in the property.
