Speed Records Fall; Paris Prints Treaties 3 Years After Signing

PARIS, June 3.—Official speed established a new record this week, when the Journal Officiel published three peace treaties nearly three years after they were signed and ten months to a day after their ratification by Parliament.

These were the treaties between the United States, Great Britain, Italy and Japan and Rumania, Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia for the protection of minorities in the last three countries. The treaties were signed September 10, 1919, ratified July 29, 1921, and published May 29, 1922.

SCIENCE SEEKING MEDIUM SECRETS FINDS LIQUID HOLDS TABLE TO HANDS

PARIS, June 3.—Prof. Charles Richet of the Institute of France, and the Academy of Medicine and his two colleagues appointed by the faculty of sciences of the Sorbonne to investigate spiritualism and the trance phenomena of mediums, are achieving some curious results.

Their work thus far has been confined to seances with Mme. Bisson, a medium well known among spiritualists of western Europe. Sir Arthur Conan Doyle has had sittings with her. She is one of the few mediums reputed to exude viscous liquid from their finger tips under trance conditions.

AMERICAN ART RAIDS ALARMING TO ENGLAND

Sir Robert Witt Warns Country Against Sale of Masterpieces, as More Disappear.

LONDON, June 3.—To the many recent complaints of the loss of art treasures through purchases by Americans, Sir Robert Witt added another warning this week when he presided at the annual meeting of the National Art Collection Fund, at the Burlington House.

"It is my duty," he said, "to warn the society that at the present moment more than one great masterpiece is in imminent danger of leaving this country; more than one masterpiece, which no country, however poor, can afford to lose. We are so impressed with the gravity of the position that we are prepared to support the chancellor of the exchequer in any method short of confiscation

which will keep these masterpieces in the country.

Sir Alfred Mond said that in these days it was necessary to enlist the penitents from the millions. "The rich are too poor to be able to afford to do much," he added. "It is not difficult to understand why there are so many public-spirited people in America prepared to pay large sums for beautiful works of art."

HUNGARIANS IN RED ARMY

10,000 War Captives in Russia Join the Bolsheviks.

BUDAPEST, May 16.—At least 10,000 Hungarians taken prisoner by Russia early in the world war have joined the red army, according to returning Hungarian officers who have just been released by the bolsheviks. Of these about sixty are officers. In addition, thousands of former Hungarian soldiers have taken up life in Russia, many having joined the communist party.
