## ROCKEFELLER GOLD STAYS IN FAMILY

### \$100,000 Goes to Executor. Four Children to Get Millions Left.

 NEW YORK, June 30.—All but \$100,000 of the great estate of William Rockefeller, brother of John D. Rockefeller and rated as one of the world's richest men, will remain in the Rockefeller family, under the terms of his will, filed for probate yesterday.  
 The \$100,000 goes to the only executor named who is not a member of the family—John A. Garver, lawyer, who drew the will. The rest of the estate—variously estimated at from \$100,000,000 to \$200,000,000—goes in four equal shares to Mr. Rockefeller's four children—William G. Rockefeller, Percy A. Rockefeller, Mrs. Emma Rockefeller McAline and Mrs. Geraldine Rockefeller Dodge.  
 Provision is made in the will that their inheritances, when they die, shall pass on to their children, although none of the estate was put in trust, except a quarter of Percy A. Rockefeller's share, which was made a trust fund for his children.  
 There were no bequests to charity. Nothing was left to old family retainers, nor to any employees of the Standard Oil Company with whom Mr. Rockefeller had been familiar.  
 The will, drawn September 5, 1919, at Tarrytown, left a trust fund of \$2,000,000 to Mr. Rockefeller's wife, Elmira G. Rockefeller, together with the use for life of all the Rockefeller town and country houses and household effects. Mrs. Rockefeller preceded her husband to the grave, however, and, under the terms of the will, this property also will be divided among the four children.

## PANIC WHEN PUPIL SWALLOWS POISON

### Fear of Not Passing Because of Her Socialism Blamed for Act of Girl.

NEW YORK, June 30.—Hannah Reichenberg, a fourteen-year-old socialist, took poison in her classroom yesterday because, she said, she feared her teachers were going to "make an example of her" by not promoting her.  
 About 500 of her schoolmates, hearing of the act, surged through the school corridors hysterically, seeking to learn who it was that had swallowed the poison.  
 Hannah was rushed to a hospital, where it was said she would recover. Her father, Harris Reichenberg, a cigar dealer, said:  
 "Hannah was a socialist. She had organized a socialist club of twenty members in the school. She gets all her lessons easily, but she always makes her answers like a socialist, and that makes the teachers angry. She feared the teachers would not pass her because of her socialist feeling."  
 Miss Ottilia M. Beha, principal of the school, refused to discuss the case, and other pupils said she had ordered them not to talk about it.

## WOMAN'S MINIMUM WAGE TO STAND AT \$16.50

### Conference Votes Against Reduction, 7 to 4—New Meeting Wednesday.

the present minimum wage for women and girls in mercantile industries of \$15.50 per week.  
 The decision was made after a recess, during which the members of the conference went over the testimony.  
 Three votes were taken. One was for a wage of \$15.25 per week, which was defeated. The second was for one of \$15.50 per week, which also

died. The third vote was for the retention of the present standard, which was adopted, 7 to 4, the three public members siding with the four representatives of the employees against the employers' representatives.  
 The decision yesterday did not affect the classification known as "learners" in the industry. A meeting will be held next Wednesday to decide the rates of minimum compensation for the novices in mercantile employment.

**INDICTED BY GRAND JURY.**  
 The grand jury today indicted William F. Best and James A. Best on charges of sending obscene matter through the mails. Indictment for grand larceny were reported against Allen J. Hobby, Theodor Jackson and Oscar Neal. Harrison Follin, Richard H. Cady, Walter Bell and Willie Madden are charged with non-support.
