INDIAN MAY LEAD IN PRIMARY REPEAL

Slight Chance Said to Depend on Bipartisan Legislative Move.

Special Dispatch to The Star. INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., July 15.—Reports that a nation-wide effort is to repeal the direct primary law in various states has led to a deal of speculation as to what may happen in Indiana when the legislature meets. One of the stories afloat is to the effect that there will be a better chance to repeal the law if the democrats control one branch of the legislature and the republicans control the other. The idea is that if both parties should have a hand in the repeal of the law both would suffer equally from any political reaction that might be incurred.

The election of Albert J. Beveridge, republican nominee for United States senator, is expected to make for the safety of the law. Mr. Beveridge is one of the pioneers of the primary in Indiana. His political followers in the legislature began the fight for the direct primary nearly twenty years ago. It is believed that Gov. Meyer, if re-elected, would support the law. At the time of the last legislative session he expressed an opinion unfavorable to the direct primary, and a vigorous effort was made to repeal the law at that time. LUMBERMEN'S FIGURES TO AID FEDERAL SERVICE

National Association Offers All Statistics for Use of Department of Commerce. With a view to co-operating with the Department of Commerce in its efforts to stabilize business, the National Lumber Manufacturers Association has placed at the service of the government the whole statistical organization of the body, it was announced yesterday at local headquarters of the association.

In a letter to the newly established trade relations division of the department Wilson Compton, secretary of the association, has offered to the government all the trade information that the lumber manufacturers compile for themselves. In this way the data will probably be made public before individual members of the association receive them, it is stated.

It is the conviction of the National Lumber Manufacturers Association that if the Department of Commerce chooses to act favorably on its offer to complete statistical cooperation with the government, other industrial associations will follow suit. It is stated, with the result that it will be possible to present to the business world periodically an accurate current statistical picture of the commercial movement of the country. It is hoped that such information, wisely diffused, will help to avoid the excessive industrial activity which is one of the great contributing causes to alternating periodical business depressions.

MRS. S. A. BOSWELL DIES. Descendant of British Royal Successors to Cerebral Hemorrhage.
