

ARLINGTON SCHOOL BOARDS NOT BURDENED

Prof. Kemp Shows Increase in Taxation Through Floating of Issue.

Special Dispatch to The Star. CLARENDON, Va., August 12.—The time has arrived when the people of this county should begin to consider seriously and in a business-like manner the education of their children.

The above is a statement of Prof. Fletcher Kemp, superintendent of Arlington county schools, who, with the county school board, is conducting a campaign of education among the parents of school children as a preliminary to a proposed building program.

Board Issue Favored. In Arlington district prominent citizens of all sections who have formed an organization known as the citizens' advisory board to the board of education have not only endorsed the program of building as set forth by Prof. Kemp and agreed to do all they can to boost the program to a successful end, but have gone on record as favoring the floating of bonds to carry out the program.

Detail of Taxation. The special school bonding law enacted by the last legislature for Arlington county has not stood for a longer period than thirty years, nor to be sold below par or at a rate of interest exceeding 6 per cent. The program for such school improvements shall exceed 77 per cent of the assessed value of the property in the county.

Could Sell at Par. From information obtained from bond brokers it is most positive that these bonds, if approved by the county board, could be sold at par value with a rate of interest not exceeding 6 per cent on the total amount in Arlington district the taxes would be increased \$1.50 on the \$1,000 and in Washington district \$1.00 on the \$1,000. It has been shown previously in the building program that all amounts asked for in the three respective districts are being spent at any one time, but they are to extend over a period of years.

Tax Rate Would Be Small. We find also that the payment of the sinking fund and interest on the first bond will reduce the rate considerably before all of the bonds would have been disposed of. In view of these positive reductions the school officials feel most safe in making the statement that if the people approve of this proposed bond issue in Arlington district the tax rate for any one year for such improvements will not exceed \$2 on the \$1,000, in Jefferson district it will not exceed \$1.50 on the \$1,000, and in Washington district \$1.00 on the \$1,000. We can further state that these last estimates, in our judgment, are the maximum and in all probability the rate will be less than stated.

View of the figures that have been given is an adequate assurance that the children of Arlington county will not be placed upon any individual. The school building program has provided for nothing but that which is absolutely needed in order that the children of Arlington county may have a fair chance in the educational world. Arlington county has provided an adequate program in providing adequate revenues for educational purposes and the revenues that have been provided have been properly utilized. The prospective program should not be wastefully used at any time or at any place, but every cent should be expended in the most judicious manner possible.

WINCHESTER.

While Arthur Brown and wife went into the thickets to pick berries near the town of Winchester, Va., three small children at home, one of whom, Bennett, wandered to a well on the premises and was drowned. The bodies of the children were found on Tuesday night. The father, James B. Cooper, retired Frederick county farmer, was being divided according to law, and under the provisions of a bond issued by the county, was found between pages of an old German Bible. It left the estate to the father's heirs.

James Houshield and five boys killed forty-five snakes one afternoon last week at Briery branch, Rockingham county, of which thirty-one were rattlers and fourteen copperheads. They first discovered the snakes while working in a field and during the battle others appeared. The slayers used clubs and stones.

Dewey I. Batt, the car inspector recently beaten and tarred and feathered at Hagerstown, Md., here on a charge of wife desertion. His wife wrote out the warrant after Mrs. Ruth Batt, who lives here, informed her of the desertion. She said she was "in love with Dewey Batt" and he did not come out of the house to see her.

Samuel E. McDonald, eighty-six, who served in the Stonewall Jackson division of the Confederate army during the Civil War, died at his home near here this week.

Clarence M. Roberts, a member of the house of delegates from Prince Georges county and who resides in Landover, asked today regarding the persistent report that he will be a candidate for the democratic nomination for Congress in the first district, said:

"As matters now stand I am a candidate, but I will not go into a campaign unless I have a fair chance of success. I believe Representative Mudd can win, but it will require a strong fight, and it will require a strong fight in addition. I am now consulting leaders in the various parts of the district and if they give me favorable replies I will announce myself as a candidate."

Life was extinct before he could be released.

WINCHESTER. LYNCHBURG, Va., August 12 (Special).—Lyle G. Woodson, manager of a drug store here, who was shot Tuesday by C. C. Bailey, owner of the store, is improving and attending physicians believe he will recover. Bailey still refuses to talk.

The city government here has reported on half pay the general in the city carpenter for twenty-seven years, during which time he was away from work only six days.

The police department here is now bending its efforts to solve the murder of William Jones, a sixteen-year-old youth, who was killed the night of July 29, on the theory that the shooting was for the purpose of securing a ransom. Although more than ten days since the boy was shot the department has been unable thus far to secure the slayer. A \$2,000 reward has been offered for a solution of the mystery.

Reports from Appomattox county show that hailstorms last week did heavy damage to growing crops, and that in one section a circle of about ten miles, many farmers have had their crops ruined from 50 to 100 per cent.

R. G. Robertson, president of the Lynchburg Tobacco Warehouse Corporation, who made a personal inspection, finds the damage heavy. Some farmers will not attempt to cut their tobacco. One farmer reported to have had 15,000 hills completely destroyed.

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The state convict camp, which worked for more than a year on the state highway leading through Amherst county, has just been moved to Bedford county where it will assist in the construction of the highway from Lynchburg to Natural Bridge.

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
