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

JEWIS CELEBRATE ZIONIST MANDATE

Telegrams From President Harding and Woodrow Wilson Read.

PALESTINE FLAG RAISED

American and British Flags Also Presented at Jubilee Mass Meeting at Central High.

Thousands of Washington Jews and many from out of town filled the Central High School auditorium to overflowing at a meeting last night in celebration of the establishment of Palestine as the Jewish homeland by the league of nations, and the acceptance by the British government on July 24 of the mandate over Palestine.

President Harding, Woodrow Wilson, Senator Lodge and associate Justice Louis B. Brandeis of the United States Supreme Court sent telegrams of congratulation, which were read at the meeting.

“I have on previous occasions expressed my sympathy toward the Zionist movement, and join you now in the feeling of rejoicing animating the Jewish people over the international recognition of their age-long aspiration to re-establish in Palestine a Jewish homeland. May your historic undertaking meet with the success it so well deserves,” was the message received from President Harding.

Telegram From Wilson.

A telegram from Woodrow Wilson sent to Rabbi J. T. Loeb, vice president of the Zionist organization, read as follows:

“I warmly appreciate your invitation and with I cordially congratulate you upon the adoption and acceptance of that mandate which is so necessary to the accomplishment of the Zionist aim now devoted to their energies to the upbuilding of Palestine.”

The following message was received from Justice Louis B. Brandeis: “May I ask you to express to the executive committee my high appreciation of its courteous message. Zionists may now devote all their energies to the upbuilding of Palestine.”

The Jewish homeland in Palestine is the first rift in the clouds that have darkened the Jewish life since their dispersion one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two years ago,” declared Representative Albert B. Ross-land of New York, who presided at the meeting.

Cheers resounded through the auditorium at the presentation of the colors. First “Old Glory” was brought to the platform to the playing of the “Star Spangled Banner.” “Union Jack,” the British flag, was presented to “God Save the King.” Finally the flag adopted by Palestine to the playing of the Jewish national air, “Hatikvah.” Representative Hamilton Fish of New York urged those present to make it impossible for any one to question their faith to their adopted country. At the same time Mr. Fish declared that there was nothing to prevent Jews in this country from lending every support possible to the upbuilding of Palestine.

Judge Bernard A. Rosenblatt of New York, who recently returned from Palestine, declared that Jews were flocking to the land of their forefathers at the rate of a thousand a month and that he expected in ten years the distance from Dan to Bethsheba to be once more populated with Jews.

Preceding the mass meeting at the Central High School a large number of people on foot and in automobiles took part in the parade which started from the Peace Monument at 6:30 and marched to 11th and Euclid streets.

Other speakers on the program were: Dr. Harry Spigel, chairman of the arrangements committee; Rabbi M. A. Horwitz, Rabbi G. Silverstone, Rabbi J. T. Loeb, Mr. Baruch Zucerman. Musical numbers were rendered by Miss Sylvia Klavans, Rev. J. Glushak and Nathan Brusiloff.

FT. WAYNE PRESS SUSPENDS.

FORT WAYNE, Ind., August 30.—The Fort Wayne Evening Press, started one year ago by the Journal-Gazette Company, will suspend publication next Saturday, it was announced last night. The announcement in the Press and also in the News-Sentinel, another evening paper, said that by “mutual agreement it has been decided to clarify the Fort Wayne newspaper situation.”

C. S. RYAN PRESIDENT.

Heads First Division Society, A. E. F., in District.

Cornelius S. Ryan, secretary-treasurer of the First Division Society, A. E. F., District of Columbia branch, at a meeting of the organization last night in the District building, was elected president, vice Lieut. M. S. Stevensen, resigned. Stanislaw Gruber of Glencaryn, Va., was elected to fill Mr. Ryan's position as secretary-treasurer. The First Division Society was organized in this city more than a year ago as a social body, originally organized when the buddies were doing duty on the Rhine, after the armistice.

Maj. John M. Greely of the War Department made the address of the evening, telling of his recent swing around the circle visiting the citizen camps.
