Men Do All the Heavy Work In and Around Hotel for Women

Fair Sex Bosses Masculine Cooks.

Boy "Bellhops" Bow to Milady Visitors.

Into the swirl of fashionable ideas that have been setting old general custom a grocery pace these last few years, steps Washington with the latest paradox—a handsome hotel for ladies only, where men do the washing, cooking and scrubbing.

The Grace Dodge Hotel, where the ladies spell equality with a capital "E," always has been noted for things—its strict prohibition on tipping, its excellent cooking and its immaculate cleanliness. To masculine thoroughness belongs credit for at least the last two.

The astonished guest finds the "English" entirely reversed there. In a handsomely appointed office, seated at a highly polished desk, Miss Mary Lindsey efficiently directs the management of the hotel. Neatly attired women greet the newcomers, assign them to rooms and touch a bell with a soft command of "front." Enter, the first representative of masculinity.

Girl Runs Elevator. A uniformed bellhop with a shiny black face and slender brass buttons runs up smartly, buries himself beneath feminine luggage and leads the guest to an elevator that is engineered by a girl. Another bellhop, similarly attired, slowly turns the revolving doors as guests enter and depart, but he keeps himself well covered in a corner.

But while smartly attired ladies bask in luxurious grandeur in a handsomely appointed lobby, behind the scenes, where the whirring of turning round, man is enthroned once more. Bending over great pots and pans, a corps of colored cooks, directed by Chef J. W. Dicks, also colored, attends to the cooking. In the laundry a lone man tends the washing machines, landing the thoroughly steamed linen over to women to iron.

Early in the morning, when guests sleep soundly, a corps of men may be seen every day scrubbing the lobby, dusting here and there and doing the thousand and one chores the world has always regarded as man's work. And so it is throughout the hotel. Of about 140 employees, forty-six are men, six of whom are white and the rest colored. But in defense of the sex, let it be said no one could do the work more thoroughly.

Women Not Strong Enough. "Yes, we have men to do the heavy work because we do not think women are strong enough," Miss Lindsey answered a question. "We started out with girl bellhops, employing two girls in the place of one boy, thinking it might lessen their work. But we found the one boy more efficient. Our lobby is cleaned by men because they are strong and better fitted to do such heavy work. The kitchen of a hotel is filled with big pots and pans, too heavy for women, and our cooks were trained by women. Certainly we have men for engineers and men to fix up the broken furniture. Wherever we can put a girl or a woman without risking her health


