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SURPRISE WITNESS TELLS OF MURDER

Quarrel and Shooting Heard From Autos, Says New Brunswick Woman.

SOMERVILLE, N. J., November 23.—Officials conducting the Hall-Mills murder inquiry devoted today to checking up details in the case. The grand jury will resume consideration of the case Monday, having adjourned last night.

Witnesses heard yesterday included James Mills, husband, and Charlotte, daughter of Mrs. Eleanor Reinhardt Mills, who was murdered with the Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall, and Mrs. Holmes H. Voorhees, a surprise witness.

Mrs. Voorhees was reported to have given the grand jury a new story of the murder. She says that on the night of the murder two automobiles coming from the direction of New Brunswick halted in front of her home about 10 o'clock. The occupants of both cars got out and she heard quarreling. She could not tell how many people were in the group, but she heard women's voices. She heard two shots and then the cars sped away.

Mrs. Jane Gibson, who said she saw the murders, has been summoned to appear before the grand jury Monday, when it reconvenes.

"Motive" Established.

Special Prosecutor Wilbur A. Mott had shown how the bodies were found. He had established, to the best of his ability—barring the testimony of two additional witnesses—what he considers the motive.

Only thirteen witnesses were called yesterday, but all of them were of the first importance. Nellie Lo Russell was among the first called. She told the grand jury that Mrs. Gibson could not have seen the shooting, because Mrs. Gibson was talking to her at the time.

George Sipel, pig raiser, was another of the day's witnesses. He has been credited with telling conflicting stories about his actions on Thursday night, September 14. According to detective Sipel said he called at the Russell shack that night to see her about a horse, and had corroboration to the extent that Theodore Knothe, a New Brunswick man, saw him do it. Knothe went into the jury room immediately after Sipel and, according to stories, both said that Mrs. Russell was not at home when they called a little before 10 o'clock. According to Mrs. Russell, she was home from 8:45 until 11 o'clock—and with Mrs. Gibson all that time.

The two Hall maids, Barbara Tough and Louise Geist, were not called yesterday. They spent their time in the witness room. Louise read, Barbara knitted. Between times, both talked to state troopers or to Charlotte Mills.

Charlotte Tells of Letter.

Charlotte was called and was in the jury room half an hour. She was more reticent than usual when she came out, but it was learned from official sources that most of the thirty minutes were devoted to an explanation of the manner in which her mother's private letters came to be sold to a newspaper.

As soon as Charlotte left, James Mills was asked to go in. He spent more than an hour inside and left the jury room pale and apparently weak.

Capt. Michael Regan of fire truck No. 3, New Brunswick, and friend of William Stevens, Mrs. Hall's eccentric brother, also was a witness.

APPLES IN SECOND CROP.

Grow Again Near Colonial Beach, on Lower Potomac.

The second crop of apples and other fruits is on the trees in and about Colonial Beach, Va., on the lower Potomac. About a month ago Attorney John C. 
