BOOTLEGGERS TAX INVOKED BY STATE

Tennessee Imposes License Fee Under Old Statute to Curb Law Violators.

CATTANOOGA, Tenn., December 19.—Tennessee bootleggers are invoking the injunction process in their battle to stay in business, now that the state attorney general seeks to levy against them heavy privilege taxes under old liquor laws.

The legal battle of the dispensers of white lightning and blockade runners to find loopholes in the state laws entered its new phase with the granting of a temporary injunction by Chancellor Garvin to W. A. (Piggy) Nolan, owner and operator of a "poolroom, cigar stand and soda fountain" on Cherry street, restraining the county from collecting \$2,357.80 privilege taxes from him for wholesaling and retailing liquor.

Liquor statutes of the state of Tennessee contain no clause similar to that of the federal law under which a bootlegger or transporter can be seized and confiscated by the state. The arrested bootleggers are held in jail after giving bond pending long-drawn-out trials, go their way merely bootlegging again in the same old machine.

Uncerths Tax Law.
Attorney General George W. Chamlee of Hamilton county, irate over the continual defiance of authority, searched the statutes to find a way to put the bootleggers out of business. He turned to the old liquor license law, which specifically provides for state and county licenses of \$500 for wholesaling and retailing liquor, and which states concisely and particularly that the payment of this license does not legalize the sale of liquor. The supreme court has repeatedly held, according to the attorney general, that bootleggers—the term covering any and all classes of whisky dispensers—are liable to the payment of the license, and that any and all property owned by them is subject to attachment and sale to satisfy these taxes, if court conviction has established the fact of their bootlegging.

Friday the attorney general asked the county court clerk for a distress warrant to recover privilege license taxes amounting to \$2,357.80 for the state and county against "Piggy" Nolan, who has been up repeatedly for possessing liquor. About thirty other operators who had been convicted were similarly targets of distress warrants. The next day Nolan, through his attorneys, filed a bill seeking to enjoin the execution of the warrant. He denied he had engaged in the sale of whisky as a retail and wholesale dealer and pointed out that he had never been convicted of selling.

Nolan Reopens Place.
Nolan immediately reopened his soft drink stand upon issuance of the temporary injunction, but other places were closed under the distress warrant and are still under lock and key and the owners have made no effort to reopen them.

In cases in which the defendants have been convicted or have pleaded guilty to selling liquor the attorney general anticipates little difficulty in selling the property attached. Auto trucks, business property and other goods have been seized.

One of the reasons why Attorney General Chamlee is employing this course is that he is having difficulty with the lawbreaker, shake hands with him and in the warmest friendship bid him good-bye. If convicted, the bootlegger appeals to the supreme court and gets a year's delay. Recently we had two cases reversed by the supreme court where the only error was that the clerk in entering up the judgment of conviction used the words "storing liquor," whereas he should have used "possessing liquor."

"Usually the bootlegger runs away during the appeal, but stays only until witnesses have left and can't be located."

"Parsons Smoke Too Much," Says Bishop in Boston

BOSTON, December 19.—Bishop Co-adjutor Slattery of the Episcopal diocese of Massachusetts, addressing an assembly of Congregational ministers, outlined his ideas of how a minister should spend his time.

"Many parsons smoke too much and read too many story books," he said, adding that while he did not oppose either, "it should be remembered that the place for a novel is not in a study."

The pastor should be studying all the time, the bishop said.

"One way to force yourself to study is to teach a class; another is to write a treatise," he added.

Bishop Slattery said he did not hold with those clergymen who refer to pastoral calls as "pulling door bells" and "drinking tea," but instead urged clergymen to make calls.

SAYS CAPTAIN SAILED FROM BOAT IN PERIL

Master of Ramm Schooner Accuses Skipper of Mail Ship of Failure to Give Aid.

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., December 19.—Capt. George McKinnon, master of the Pacific Mail passenger steamer Newport, has been accused formally of sailing away and leaving in peril the lumber schooner Svea, when the two were full of liquor near Fort San Luis a few days ago. A complaint was filed with the federal steamboat inspectors here by Capt. Carl R. Eberberg of the Svea. Investigation has been ordered. After the collision the Svea was capsized and a great hole was torn in the Newport. The crew of the Svea escaped.

Capt. McKinnon declares that the Newport, carrying passengers, was in imminent danger and was forced to leave, while the crew of the Svea was safe.

MISSIONARY DIES AT 78.
TACOMA, Wash., December 19.—Rev. Thomas B. Wood, seventy-eight, missionary, died here at the home of his son-in-law, F. A. Hazeltine. Mr. Wood was president of Valparaiso, Ind. College in 1870, when he went to the Argentine Republic as a Methodist missionary. He became United States consul at Rosario and professor of astronomy in the National University there. He established the first Protestant missions in Peru, Paraguay and Ecuador.
