Lincoln Center, Kans., Nov. 18.—A change in the plans of the defense of Sherrill Clark, A. N. ### Bronchos Drag Woman to Death in Five Mile Run.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 18.—Mrs. Flora Hamilton Cassell, 59, former president of the W. C. T. U., and the wife of Rev. E. T. Cassell, Baptist minister here, is dead today after having been dragged five miles by a runaway team of bronchos. Mutilated almost beyond recognition, the back and limbs broken, the body was found near Englewood, a suburb.

### "Burglar Proof" Vault Wrecked

Belleville, Ill., Nov. 18.—One of the "burglar proof" steel vaults of the new \$100,000 postoffice here was blown open by nitroglycerine early today and robbed of \$40 in cash and \$200 in stamps. The robbers escaped, leaving no clew.
