

a pinch' to satisfy police conscience, and to make it appear as if the police were trying to suppress this evil. Many of these unfortunate women claim they have 'protection,' and are not afraid of the police."

Lists of all-night saloons and dives are given, as well as "shady" hotels. Women are openly permitted to accost men in the first, second, third, 27th, 28th, 38th and 39 precincts.

The report says: "In certain parts of the city disorderly saloons have been and are now being permitted to run in open and notorious violation of the police orders, with full knowledge of the police, and, up to a recent period, without any attempt to regulation.

"A statement by responsible commanding officers that there are no violations of their orders is conclusive again of one of two things—inefficiency or complicity. The commission has collected a mass of evidence showing beyond the possibility of a doubt that large numbers of saloon keepers on all three sides of the city cater to and protect the trade of disreputable women, and could not exist but for it.

Princeton Cafe, 33 South Clark street, with notorious Hotel Veley in connection.

George Silver, 95 W. Randolph street.

The Piccadilly, 162 W. Wash-

ington street.

Tuckhorn's, 23 W. Quincy street. In connection with this Tuckhorn runs the Hotel Pfister at 505 South Fifth avenue, where many of the women who frequent this place live.

German Village Cafe, 816 S. State street, Andy Craig, proprietor.

The Tivoli, 846 S. State street, Andy Craig, proprietor.

Charles West's, two saloons at 539 and 662 S. State street.

The Brunswick Club on Plymouth place.

Maxim's, 2107 to 2111 Wabash avenue.

Roy Jones, 2037 Wabash ave

The Cadillac, 2134-8 Wabash avenue, a combination all night saloon and general tough place.

Buxbaum's, Twenty-second and State streets, with Hotel Marlborough in connection. Known from Maine to California as a place always open and "show" place in Chicago.

Freiberg's dance hall, 18 East Twenty-second street, regarding which no comment is necessary.

In Negro Section.

In so-called Black Belt a saloon situation which is a disgrace to a civilized community. Comprises State street, from a short distance south to Twenty-second street to Thirty-eighth street.

On The West Side

Boller's (Mike the Pike), 40 Halsted street.

The Globe (M. Fewer), 200 Halsted street.

The Soubrette (M. Fewer), 67 W. Madison street, with hotel
