WHAT TO DO FOR POISON Opium.

Opium poisoning may be known by the contracted pupils of the victim, and by the slow breathing. At first the breathing is slow and full, but it gradually grows slower and shallower. The "pin point" pupil is the most characteristic symptom.

Give emetics—a teaspoonful of mustard in warm water or a tablespoonful of sirup of ipecac.

Remember that opium poisoning may result not alone from the drug in its original form, but from laudanum, morphine, paregoric and the various soothing sirups and cough cures that depend upon opium for their action.
