Shreveport, La.—"The Ark of Refuge," haven for fallen girls, and supposed to shelter 200 inmates, was raided by vice commission. Female detectives applying for entrance found home deserted by all except "Rev." W. H. West and his wife, who fled. Books show that Wests took in more than \$400,000 in the last two years.

Kansas City.—Nine hours a day, instead of ten, and an increase in wages, will be given 6,000 employes of M. P. and R. I. Rys., as result of conference here today.

Port Au Prince.—Gen. Tamerede Augusta, president of Republic of Hayti, died here today.

St. Cyr.—Sergeant Battini, flying in military biplane, fell 100 feet. Killed.

Hopedale, Mass.—Arturo Giovannitti, I. W. W. leader of Lawrence fame, arrested charged with violating new town by-law forbidding parading without permit.

Indianapolis.—Odis Skinner is recovering in local hospital from operation of Thursday.

New York.—Harry K. Thaw will be state witness in trial of John Nicholson Anhut, lawyer, indicted for bribery in alleged attempt to gain Thaw's release from Matteawan Asylum for Criminal Insane.

Sacramento.—Administration anti-alien land holding bill passed Senate shortly after midnight.

Nutley, N. J.—Wm. Brandol postponed self-destruction until he had eaten some of his wife's corned beef and cabbage. A note said he committed suicide to escape further house cleaning.

Madison.—Gov. McGovern today vetoed Scott bill reducing time limit within which action may be brought against insurance companies for loss by fire from six to two years.

St. Paul.—Mrs. Susie Langford released after she pleaded guilty to passing forged check in local store.

Word received here that her husband had been sentenced to five years in N. Y. for forgery yesterday.

Denver.—Dutin Christman, sentenced to 30 days in county jail for vagrancy, is wanted in Jefferson City, Mo., as a fugitive from insane asylum there.

Madison.—Sen. H. Teasdale introduced bill prohibiting boys under 21 from playing pool, billiards or bowling in public places and prohibiting loitering of minors in pool halls and bowling alleys. Keepers will be fined \$25.

Oakland, Cal.—H. J. Janssen, Los Angeles aviator, killed when struck by whirling propeller.

London.—Countess of Cottenham found shot to death in woods near Goring. Had been hunting. Family stated death was accidental.

Madison.—Senate killed Wiegler bill dividing state into ten "health districts."

London.—\$500,000 freight depot completely destroyed and \$2,500 loss in fire in local school, which is believed to have been work of militant suffragettes. "Votes for women" posters found about two structures.

New York.—Magistrate Marsh decided ownership of "Shep," a collie, by putting Mrs. Morrissey and Mrs. Maurer on opposite sides of courtroom and having them call the dog. "Shep" went to Mrs. Morrissey.

Washington.—Mrs. W. J. Bryan has returned from sanitarium to her home. Recovered from her recent illness.

Toledo, O.—Reported at National Cloak, Suit & Skirt Association meeting here that fall and winter styles for women will include all kinds of animal effects.

Rome.—Pope Pius X. after illness of many weeks received Cardinals Pompili and Delai today.
