W. VIRGINIA IN DANGER OF NEW INDUSTRIAL WAR

Charleston, W. Va., June 28.—West Virginia must go through another industrial war, which will be worse than the Kanawha coal field war, which cost one hundred lives and hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Fifteen thousand miners in the New River fields today received a strike call, fixing July 1 as the day for a general lockout.

With these fifteen thousand will walk out the 10,000 men of the Paint and Cabin Creek district.

The strike call, which was held up for two days at the request of Gov. Hatfield, was sent out last night when the mine owners broke off all negotiations.

Union leaders have been importing tents and food supplies into the New River coal fields for months.

One thousand men already are out in the Paint and Cabin Creek districts. The mine owners there are

not living up to the terms of the strike settlement contract, and are persecuting men they know to have been active in the union.

Springfield, Ill.—Gov. Dunne today signed the Chicago municipal court bill.

Washington. — Attorney General McReynolds today sent House Judiciary Committee all papers in Western Fuel and Diggs-Caminetti cases, thus forestalling the Kahn resolution, which would have forced him to do so.

Springfield, Ill.—Gov. Dunne put crimp in toy pistol today. Signed bill making it misdemeanor to sell, trade or give away any toy pistol made to shoot blank cartridges. \$25 fine for each offense.
