London.—Four unidentified militants attacked and horsewhipped Dr. Pearson, medical officer of Holloway jail. Pearson recently threatened to hold hunger striking militants in jail until they became mental wrecks.

Detroit.—Fire caused by lightning did \$150,000 damage in wholesale district.

St. Louis.—Governors of 25 states sued for \$200 by Roscoe C. Specking, court reporter. Says he was hired to report Lake-to-the-Gulf Deep Waterway Association convention and never was paid. Intended to sue President Wilson, but found chief executive cannot be sued.

Neillsville, Wis.—Two posses searching for bandit who held up State Bank of Chile last night and escaped with \$1,400 in currency.

Milwaukee.—County clerk says hereafter office will be open until 8 Wednesday night to issue marriage licenses. Says young men can't take day off to get licenses, and Wednesday night in Milwaukee is the popular night to take girls out walking.
