MILLIONS PITTED AGAINST THE LAW —THAW CASE IN A NUTSHELL

*Thaw Family Willing to Spend a Million to Keep Harry
K. Thaw From Being Returned to Asylum—Mad-
man Feels Certain He Is Beyond Clutches of
the Law—Wants New Sanity Trial.*

Sherbrooke, Que., Aug. 20.—Harry K. Thaw will be released today because the commitment under which he was placed in jail is absurdly irregular, but he will be re-arrested immediately.

The immigration authorities will immediately take charge of him and unless he produces the ticket to Detroit which he claims to have, he will be deported immediately, being sent back to the United States by the same route that he entered Canada.

Although he willingly admits his identity and was really the cause of his own arrest by declaring he was Thaw when he noticed a man looking at a portrait of the escaped Matteawan madman, doubt still lingers

in the minds of United States officials that Thaw would deliberately give himself up in such a fashion after his cunning scheme of escape.

Persistent reports are coming from New York that the man being held in Sherbrooke is not Thaw at all but another man who is impersonating the lunatic while Thaw makes his escape.

Since his arrest Thaw has paced his cell continuously. His eyes have a wild, strained look of sleeplessness. He declined to be photographed because his collar was soiled and his clothes mussed up, and he showed obvious pleasure when men, women and children from neighboring villages flocked into Sherbrooke and yelled remarks of encouragement to him.

Courteously, but firmly, he has re-
