SULZER FORMALLY OUSTED FROM GOVERNOR'S SEAT

Albany, N. Y., Oct. 17.—William Sulzer, elected governor of the state of New York last November by a plurality of more than 200,000 votes, was formally removed from office by the high court of impeachment by a vote of 43 guilty to 12 not guilty on three of the eight counts for "high crimes and misdemeanors," charged against him by the Tammany assembly.

Members of the court of impeachment left Sulzer but one ray of hope when they stripped him of his high

office. They did not take from him the right to run for office again.

While making no public statement at this time, the deposed governor said to his intimates that he welcomed the verdict under the circumstances, as the filing of the impeachment had ruined his usefulness as governor. There is a rumor that he will run for the same office at the next election, but neither this nor the report that he would carry the case to the Supreme Court of the United States could be confirmed.

Lieut.-Gov. Glynn took the oath as governor before Secretary of State May shortly before 1 o'clock.
