Albany, N. Y.—General Rosalie Jones' army of suffraget hikers reached here.

Mineola, L. I.—Will of Chas. E. Appleby, New York realty dealer, disposes of \$50,000,000 estate. Was practically unknown.

Rome.—King Victor Emanuel, who dislikes all dancing, studying tango in order to combat it.

St. Paul, Minn.—After seeing best friend sent to prison for life, Joseph Gyarmati who, with John Osik was sentenced to life imprisonment for murdering Gyarmati's wife, confessed that Osik knew nothing of murder.

Great Falls, Mont.—Because Adolph Schuder, farmer; threatened to drag Ladimer Shadek, neighbor, to death, Adolph Schuder, 15, killed father.

Portland, Ore.—Burglar's partner killed burglar wounded by H. J. Hatcher, who discovered men in house and shot one.

San Francisco.—Mrs. Jos. Graves, mother of Mrs. Mary Cox, who was found shot to death in Los Angeles, says daughter was to have married Wm. Melton, also killed, in few days.

St. Louis.—12 St. Louis state banks and 10 trust companies not eligible to enter federal reserve system. Capital stock less than \$200,000.

Greenville, Ill.—Greenville College closed indefinitely. Scarlet fever case.

Cheltenham, Eng.—\$30,000 fire, supposedly set by arsonettes, destroyed gymnasium and geological and chemical laboratories of St. Paul's training school.

Washington.—Major J. H. Hughes, First Cavalry, charged with being intoxicated on 13 occasions while on duty, sentenced to be dismissed from
