New York.—Col. Geo. Goethals said if he were free to choose after completion of Panama canal he would accept police commissioner-ship of New York.

New Haven, Conn.—Strong School building destroyed by fire. Loss \$150,000.

Cleveland, O.—2,500 telegraphers, telephone operators, levermen and station agents voting on question of calling strike on Lake Shore and Big Four Railroads.

Vera Cruz.—Teodoro Dehesa, ex-governor of state and friend of Porfirio Diaz, arrested, charged with plotting. Arrested on order of Gen. Huerta.

Mexico City.—Many members Mexico City police department dismissed on orders Gen. Huerta following discovery alleged plot to assassinate Huerta.

New Martinsville, W. Va.—Three yeggmen robbed safe of B. & O. ticket office and blew safe of U. S. Express Co. Secured \$125. Two captured, third got away with money.

Boston.—Fishing schooner F. H. Hutchins struck by City of Boston steamer. Sunk. Crew rescued.

Humphrey, Ark.—Yeggs looted Merchants' and Planters' Bank. Escaped with \$3,300.

New York.—Bob Fitzsimmons, ex-heavyweight champion of the world, is permanently barred from appearing in ring in N. Y. state by ruling Supreme Court.

Paris.—Oliver Montague, rich manufacturer of Buffalo, N. Y., killed by 300-foot fall while climbing Jungfrau in Swiss Alps.

New York.—Alfred Lehman, 23, told on witness stand of being implicated in two murders, score of bomb outrages, abduction of young girls for white slave purposes, and operations of "black hand" gang because he believed other members of gang deserted him after bomb had been planted in Lyndhurst, N. J.

South Bend, Ia.—Architect W. W. Schneider and Contractor Edward Solarek held responsible for collapse of building Jan. 3 and death of 4 persons in report by investigating committee.

London.—Result of rate war, Cunard and White Star steamship lines announced reductions.

Quebec, Que.—5 persons burned to death, 1 probably fatally injured at Notre Dame Rosaire. Kitchen stove exploded in home of Jos. Robin.

New York.—Lucius M. Littauer, ex-congressman, and brother, of firm of Littauer Bros., indicted charged with smuggling.

Seattle.—Pacific steamship Sofia reported ashore in Alert Bay. Steamer Alki reported taking off wrecked steamship's passengers.

Milwaukee.—2 dead, 2 in serious condition result of gas escaping from stove in home of John Bagenhi.

New York.—Battleship Arkansas quarantined. 1 seaman has diphtheria; 17 have sore throats.

Little Rock, Ark.—Supreme court affirmed 5 year sentence against J. D. Farrell, blind medium, charged with causing suicide pact resulting in death of Rhoda Carter and Mrs. M. C. Turner by pretending to receive advice from spirits.

Trenton, Mo.—Conductor Frank Neal killed, 3 trainmen injured when Rock Island engine jumped track and rolled over.

Amsterdam.—58 children, 16 women, 1 man killed in moving picture theater. Trampled in panic when film exploded.

Delta, Ia.—Albert Taylor, farmer, shot wife twice, shot himself and cut throat with razor. Dead. Wife may die. Quarrel.

Milwaukee, Wis.—2,000 unemployed laborers put to work cleaning streets of heavy snow.

Washington.—Steamship freight lines operating on Great Lake must transport butter, eggs, fresh meat
