## "COLLINS ADMITTED STRIKE," SAYS MRS. RAYMOND ROBINS ON STAND

*Noted Social Worker Says Collins Told Her That Cooks  
and Bakers Had Struck—Restaurant Bosses  
Had Spy Trailing Her*

"Wm. G. Collins, manager of Henri's, admitted there was a strike of the cooks and bakers of his place." With this testimony Mrs. Raymond Robins, president of the National Woman's Trade Union League, shattered the pretension of the Restaurant Keepers' Association that the trouble at Henri's was merely a boycott in which none of the Henri employees were involved.

Mrs. Robins proved an effective witness for the girls. Collins' admission of the strike of his cooks and bakers was made to herself, Jane Addams, Harriet Vittum and Grace

Abbott at the big mass meeting in Hull House two weeks ago, according to Mrs. Robins.

"At that meeting Mr. Collins refused to allow a committee of women to go to the restaurant and ask the 53 girls employed there under what circumstances they signed the affidavits saying they were perfectly satisfied," said Mrs. Robins.

"I asked him why he didn't give his girls one day off in seven," she continued, "and he sounded the old cry of the department stores when the subject of a minimum wage came up, 'I will if the others do.' A few
