## EASY MONEY BROUGHT YOUNG BOY TO GALLOWES AT EIGHTEEN

*Jack Jungmeyer Has Death Cell Interview With  
Youngest Convict Who Must Pay Penalty for  
Brutal Murder of Messenger Boy.*

San Quentin Prison, Cal., March 16.—By a strange moral quirk he was unwilling to ask his parents for money they would have given him, but did not hesitate to beat another boy to death to get \$20 for a Christmas holiday with his sweetheart.

That is why Louis Bundy, 18-year-old high school boy of Los Angeles and one of the youngest convicts ever sentenced to death in California, is to be hanged here on April 24.

"I couldn't ask for money from my parents nor my friends—didn't have the nerve," he explained when

they had led him from the condemned row across the flowering court to a bench in the sunshine of the yard. There was a certain expectancy of approval about the boy's explanation.

"And yet you had the nerve to club another boy, to kill, for a few dollars," I said.

"Yes, he died," was the reply. "Though I didn't mean to kill him, I only wanted to knock him out. It was not until next day that I knew he was dead. He was still screaming when I took the money and ran away. I wanted to give my girl a good time Christmas day."
