MAY BE A GENERAL STRIKE ON NATALBY'S

There will probably be a general strike on Natalby's restaurant called within the next few days. Last night the Waitresses' Union heard the grievances of the girls who walked out of Natalby's.

THE MEXICAN SITUATION

Mexico City, March 28.—General Huerta started 2,000 conscripted soldiers for Torreon today in a desperate effort to save the besieged city. The men were picked up on the streets of the capital, pressed into service, fitted with arms and uniforms and hurriedly placed aboard trains.

El Verjel, Durango.—Gen. Francisco Villa has been informed that Gen. Maclovios Herrera, together with part of the Zaragoza brigade, has captured almost the entire southern portion of Torreon. The entire northern portion of Torreon is in flames.

The federal loss in the battle of Lerdo and Gomez Palacio was enormous, according to figures compiled today. 800 dead have been picked up on the two battlefields. The constitutionalist loss was 100 dead and 200 wounded in the two battles.

TOLEDO PEOPLE WON'T PAY MORE THAN THREE CENTS

Toledo, O., March 28.—Street car conductors refused to accept three-cent fares today and thousands of persons, declining to pay more, were allowed to ride free, pending federal court action expected to effectively make Toledo's street car fare war a legal tangle. The city council's ordinance decreeing three-cent fares became effective today. There was no disorder.

Officials of the Toledo Rail and Light Company, warned that the city's police force and courts would stand behind citizens demanding three-cent transportation, forestalling violence by declining to charge the insistent passengers. Mayor Keller was among those who attempted to ride for three cents today. Like others, he was given a free ride.
