HOYNE STRENGTHENS CHARGES AGAINST TRAINING SCHOOL

State's Attorney Maclay Hoyne strengthened his charges against the Illinois Training School for Nurses today by supplying some new figures that appear exceedingly interesting.

Hoyne has already charged that the school padded bills to the amount of \$10,700 in four months.

It is the duty of this board to supply well-trained nurses for county service. And for this it has apparently been paid well.

Last year the school got \$167,000 out of Cook county. This year President "Aleck" McCormick tried to get the school \$197,100. The Industrial School is very dear to the heart of Julius Rosenwald. Rosenwald is very dear to the heart of McCormick.

But the majority of the board rebelled at this and no formal contract was entered. As a consequence, the board passed a resolution granting the same amount for the first four months of the fiscal year beginning Dec. 1, 1913, as they received for the first four months of the previous fiscal year. This was \$55,000. But at

the end of the four months of this fiscal year they turned in a bill for \$67,500, or an increase of \$12,500.

The county pays the training school \$550 a year for the education of each nurse. Out of this the girl gets \$60 to \$120 a year. The rest goes to the school.

The contract between the school and the county has existed for thirty years. Out of the money paid it by the county in that time the school has been able to buy up \$218,000 worth of property.

Where they now get \$550 from the county for the education of each nurse, ten years ago they only got \$200. They show an ambition to get much more. Aleck McCormick is now trying to help them, although the school is supposed to be aided by such "philanthropists" as Rosenwald and Thorne of Montgomery Ward's. Hoyne promises further action.

FOUR FORMER SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS TO BE SEATED

The eight school board members who were sentenced to 30 days in jail for contempt of court for refusing to obey Judge Foell's order to reinstate the four ousted school board members got cold feet after the judge sentenced them to jail and agreed to welcome the four men.

The school trustees who faced jail were President Peter Reinberg, Dean Walter T. Sumner, Jacob M. Loeb, Julius Smetanka, Chas. S. Peterson, Ralph C. Otis, Harry Lipskey and Michael Collins. They refused to seat John Harding, James B. Dibelka, Chas. O. Sethness and Henry W. Huttman, who were dropped by the mayor after they tried to get rid of Sup't of Schools Ella Flagg Young.

The members who took their places and who are now dropped are John A. Metz, Axel Strom, John W. Eckhart and Joseph A. Holpuch.

The jail sentence has been suspended pending their "good behavior."
