WORKING GIRLS CAUGHT IN RAID BY POLICE ON SHADY HOTEL

*Four Girls, Victims of Starvation Wages, Arrested With
Men—Tell Story of Their Fight To Be Decent and
Their Fall—All Under Twenty-One.*

The police raided the Hotel La Plant at 1819 W. Harrison street on May 3. They had been told by people in the neighboring homes that "prostitutes were bringing men up there."

So the police went out expecting to find a diveful of professional hustlers who had been driven from the redlight district by the late John Wayman's cleanup.

But they brought back a patrol wagon load of working girls; little girls with the tears of shame streaming down their face; girls whose

youth and innocent appearance shocked the grim, unemotional police who are used to many strange things.
