

OUTSIDE NEWS FROM WIRE AND CABLE

London.—Three slashes were cut in portrait of Duke of Wellington in Royal Academy today when Mary Ansell, a militant suffragette, attacked picture.

New Orleans, La.—Miss Augusta Edwards, 24, who last July killed Geo. Riehl, merchant, after charging that he wronged her, committed suicide in her cell here today.

Norfolk, Va.—Boiler explosion on steamer Jefferson of Old Dominion line killed seven members of crew. Injured others. Two may die. Jefferson reached Norfolk under own steam.

Cleveland.—Torrential rain and lightning storm caused two deaths and heavy property damage in Northern Ohio. Mrs. Abram Drake, 70, struck and killed by lightning at Van Wert. Mrs. F. Elward at Findlay died of fright during storm.

Pittsburgh.—Dr. George W. Goetz, prominent physician of McKeesport, became confused in storm, stumbled on Pennsylvania tracks and was killed by train he was to take for home. One negro killed and five injured when tenement was blown down at New Kensington.

Johnston, Pa.—Church steeple blown into street, doing much damage. No one hurt. Storm throughout Pennsylvania caused heavy property damage. Communication cut off.

New Philadelphia, O.—Mrs. John Grim, wife of farmer, chopped her 17-year-old daughter with axe, then cut girl's throat with razor. Mother will be taken to asylum. Daughter was invalid and constant care of her preyed on woman's mind.

Indianapolis.—Anthony McKearn, 66, went to grave of his two little daughters in cemetery, drank acid and fell dead on mound.

Rochester, N. Y.—Mrs. Emma Leroy, wife of former member of local police department, outraged and murdered in yard within half a mile of center of city.

Minneapolis.—Claire Hofecker, Elmwood, Wis., disappeared. Police fear she will take her life because of disappointment in love affair.

San Francisco.—Physicians attending man who held up incoming coast train and was shot and beaten said he will recover. Letters in his pocket addressed to James Hogue, Flagstaff, Ariz.

Madison, Wis.—Two killed and two severely injured. Lightning.

Olathe, Kas.—Absalom Meyers and wife killed. Buggy struck by Frisco train.

New Orleans.—Benjamin Clark Lablanc, banker-planter, lost fortune. Suicided.

Galesburg, Ill.—D. E. Yocum, millionaire, dead.

New York.—John Calhoun Mayo, Democratic national committeeman from Kentucky, richest man in state, dead.

Milwaukee.—Mrs. Carmello Musso, recently convicted of murder of her husband, Joseph Musso, sentenced to life imprisonment.

Hagerstown, Md.—"Coxey's Army" dwindled to 20 privates and 10 officers arrived here en route to Washington.

Washington.—Prof. Max Fleuss, sec'y Brazilian institution, officially denied that Col. Roosevelt had demanded fee for lecture before Brazilian historical and geographical institute.

London.—Mrs. Harriet Tice, who said she was the original of Dickens' Little Nell in "The Old Curiosity Shop," dead.

Mobile, Ala.—178 German refugees from Mexico arrived here on the Ypiranga.

New York.—Because the late Lemuel Littleton's horse is eating up his estate, executor under the will asked surrogate's permission to shoot the animal.

Harbin, Manchuria.—U. S. Consul Southard suicided. Ill health.
