#### MAX HAYES RAPS MEDDLERS IN SOCIALIST PARTY

Four main issues will be thrown to the front by the Socialists in their congressional campaign which will open actively Sept. 1. These issues will be:

1. The failure of the Wilson administration to abolish poverty, congregate monopoly, or reduce the cost of living.

2. Government ownership of railroads and coal mines.

3. The necessity for Socialist measures to solve the problem of the unemployed.

4. The treason of American capitalists in bringing on the present situation in Mexico.

These issues were discussed before the national committee in the Sherman House today, following the report of the committee on organization and propaganda.

July 15 every one of the 100,000 members of the Socialist party will pay over one day's wage to the party treasury. Morris Hillquitt said the plan would net \$250,000 if all members came through and that even if only ten per cent respond it will bring in \$25,000.

Each year a Red Week is to be observed. During this week every party member will make a special effort to get new members into the party and to secure more subscribers to party papers. Red Week in Germany last year added 168,000 members and over

100,000 new subscribers to Socialist papers, it was stated.

"Americans are more subject to emotional revivals than the Germans," said Hillquitt, "and this plan should be tried."

Max Hayes yesterday took a rap at Socialists who "meddle" in the trade union movement. He said:

"When I consider the peculiar gymnastics of some of our most intelligent comrades during the past ten years I am not surprised at the slow progress we are making. When we go before trade unions and throw our party propaganda into their faces we are told that we are meddling and we are. It appears that every time we make a little headway some comrade comes across with more meddlesome interference with the trade unions."

Hayes attack was directed at W. M. Doyle of Alabama, who had proposed a resolution that every American workman be instructed to get a Winchester repeating rifle and 200 rounds of ammunition to have ready in case of "trouble."

"Let's keep hands off the trade union movement," said Hayes. "We don't want trades unionists to tell us how to run our party and we've got no business telling them how to run their unions."

#### SPEAK FOR WORKING GIRLS—ARRESTED FOR IT

New York, May 13.—Miss Elizabeth Dutcher, suffragist and social worker, and Paul Howard Douglas, a student in Columbia University, were arrested last night when they endeavored to hold a meeting to improve the condition of working girls in department stores, notwithstanding the fact that Miss Dutcher showed the police a permit from Police Commissioner Wood to hold meetings.

Miss Dutcher testified before the senate committee investigating legislation in 1912 and was a candidate for alderman on the Socialist ticket in 1911.
