Washington. — Henry Gannett, president National Geographic Society, declared Col. Roosevelt's discovery of new river in Brazil was O. K. Maps show plenty of territory to contain river 1,000 miles long.

Washington.—Rep. Doremus, Democrat, Michigan, will run for re-election on anti-suffrage platform.

Dallas, Tex.—Divorced yesterday, Harry Fulkerson, 25, shot and killed his former wife and then killed himself in street. Couple were divorced in 1912 also, but remarried.

Blakesburg, Ia.—Crowds thronged this village to do honor to Frank Deverick, 19, U. S. marine killed at Vera Cruz. Congressman Kirkpatrick delivered eulogy. G. A. R. and Spanish war veterans escorted body.

Pittsburgh.—Francis Patrick de Lowry, killed at Vera Cruz, buried today. Vice President Marshall was present at funeral. Militia regiments escorted body.

Windsor, Ont. — Two persons were slightly injured when five cars of Michigan Central train "Wolverine," New York to Chicago, were derailed 50 miles east of here.

Denver.—Auto bandits broke into Silver Grill restaurant. Carried away 400-pound safe containing \$1,000 and jewels.

Winnipeg, Man.—Edward Gallagher, 51, suicided by throwing himself in front of express train.

Washington.—American death roll at Vera Cruz swelled to 20, when Private Maurice Welsh of Company A, 19th Infantry, fell from roof.

Washington.—Peter G. Thompson, president Champion Paper Co., Hamilton, O., placed on trial on charge of bribery in connection with contract to furnish government postcard paper.

New York.—Mrs. Belle Mahon responded to "hello, kid" of masher by taking off her slipper, beating him over head and forcing him to retreat through a pane of glass.

New York.—Rev. Dr. Bouck White, graduate Harvard University and formally ordained minister, sentenced to 6 months in workhouse for causing disturbance in Rockefeller church Sunday.

New York. — New dreadnought Texas left to join Atlantic fleet at Vera Cruz.

Cleveland, O.—600 grade teachers of the public schools voted to form labor union to enforce wage demands.

Berlin.—Frau Scholtens lost divorce case because husband, supporting contention she has been happy, proved she had gained 30 pounds in last 8 months.

St. Louis.—Locked in kitchen by mother, Anna Florian, one year old, played with matches and died of her burns.

Fort Wayne, Ind.—50 houses isolated by highest water city has had in recent years with exception of flood of last year.

Cleveland.—15,000 women pledged against present-day modes of attire and will adhere to principle of modest dress.

Peoria, Ill.—John Gebhardt has been arrested for third time on charges brought against Roy Root, his double.

Chattanooga, Tenn.—Eight general prisoners at Fort Oglethorpe escaped from Eleventh Cavalry regiment guard house by sawing out ventilator.

London.—Bunyan's "Pilgrim's Progress" has just been printed in Swahili language, making 115th distinct tongue in which it has been published to date.
