

GET PAID FOR MASSACRE

Denver, May 19.—Gen. Chase, in command of the state militia, shows by his own records submitted to the state senate that of 169 men in the two militia divisions most active in the fighting of Ludlow, the burning of the tent colony and the massacre of 20 men, women and children, 126 were employes of the big coal operators.

Troop A, 130 men, had 122 coal corporation employes, 71 being employes of Rockefeller's Colorado Fuel & Iron Co. These employes of Rockefeller were sworn in as members of the state militia. And the state of Colorado will pay them for their work, including murder, for the coal operators.
