## CHILD SPECIALISTS TO MEET NEXT FALL

More than 200 specialists on child life in school and in the home will take part in the Fourth International Congress of Home Education to be held September 22 to 29 in Philadelphia.

Five hundred delegates including official representatives from twenty foreign nations will attend.

Philadelphia won the conference mainly through the efforts of Mrs. J. Scott Anderson, directress of Torresdale House. She has since been made general secretary of the organization.
