GIRL KILLED MAN WHO WANTED HER TO GO TO THE BAD

New York, June 23.—The most dramatic story of murder police headquarters hear has heard in many a year was related today by Maria Magalusio, eighteen years old and pretty, when she told how she slew Giuseppe Marino to prevent his driving her to the life of the street.

"Yes. I killed him. He wanted me to be bad," said the girl, facing her interrogators calmly.

"He beat me and kicked me. When his back was turned I grabbed his gun and shot him dead. I had a right to do it, didn't I?" and the girl naively turned to the detectives for confirmation.

Marino was found shot to death in a flat at 634 East Thirteenth street on April 10. William Flack reported the death to the police and they, by third degree methods, forced from him admission that he and the Magalusio girl had lured the dead man to the flat and there killed him.

Flack is in the Tombs accused of the killing. The police only last night found the girl.

"Two years ago," the girl said, "I eloped with Joe Stabasio. Six months ago he deserted me. Then, my parents being angry with me, I went to live with my brother Tony. Marino, who was the leader of a gang of white slavers and black hand men, frequently came to the flat.

"He wanted me to be a tool for

the black hand gang, to collect their money. Once he got me to go to meet a man and get \$500 in a cigar box.

"I went, but saw some police and was afraid. When I came back Marino beat me. Tony heard of it and whipped Marino. Then the Marino gang framed Tony up and had him sent to the penitentiary on a charge of horse stealing.

"With Tony out of the way Marino came to my room on the morning of April 6. It was three o'clock. With a revolver in one hand and a razor in the other he broke in the door and ordered me to yield myself to the members of his gang.

"I refused and begged and prayed him to spare me, but he hit me and I fell down. I pretended to be dead and the rest of the gang left. I thought Marino had gone, too, but when I got up he was there. He waved the revolver and told me he would kill me unless I went on the street for him.

"I said, 'I'll do it, Joe, but for God's sake put that gun away.' Marino laid the gun on the table and started to kiss me. I saw my chance when his back was turned and I grabbed the gun and shot him dead."

FATALLY SHOT IN SCUFFLE

Eugene Berenson, 50, wealthy jeweler and owner of a hotel, was shot and fatally wounded this afternoon in a scuffle with Frank Jabey, 19, owner of a poolroom.

Jabey told the police that he accused Berenson of inducing Mrs. Jabey, who is only 18 years old, to accompany him to his hotel and keeping here there for several days. He declared that Berenson drew a revolver and the trigger was pulled during the fight.
